**BUILD LINES
 TO COOS BAY**

A. P. Davis Says Hill and Harriman People Are Building Rapidly From Vale.

"The residents of Vale and Central Oregon are more enthusiastic over Coos Bay than they are here," remarked A. P. Davis of the C. A. Smith mill who returned this morning from a visit with relatives at Vale. "They are at work on two railroads there and the people of that section are confident that both are heading for Coos Bay.

"The Hill people are building one line and the Harriman people the other. They are doing lots of work, too. I drove out about twenty-five miles along the route and the road had been graded and they are now at work on the big tunnel. Both roads are to use the tunnel.

"Everybody there was inquiring about Coos Bay, the harbor, its possibilities, the size and depth of the Bay and about shipping.

"There is quite an influx of population there this year. Central Oregon will develop quite rapidly during the next few years. The older residents there seem to think the rapidity and extent of the development will depend on how quickly the railroads are completed from there to Coos Bay."

No Other News.
 No news has yet been received from San Francisco relative to the awarding of the sub-contracts on the Coos Bay-Eugene line by the MacArthur, Perka Co.

Henry Sengstacken, who returned yesterday from San Francisco, said that he did not hear any railroad news while there. He saw J. V. Smeaton, general manager of the C. A. Smith company, who informed him that the company was figuring on bringing the material and equipment here on the Redondo and Nann Smith for the contractors and also on selling them considerable timber for the construction work. However, Mr. Smeaton had not been notified as to who the sub-contractors would be.
