MONSTER LOG IS TAKEN OUT

Spruce Giant Weighed Over 80 Tons and Scales Over 19,600 Feet.

The largest log ever hauled on a train anywhere and one of the largest ever brought out was brought from the Smith-Powers Camp No. 2 on Isthmus Inlet last week to the C. A. Smith mill. The monster log is estimated to have weighed over eighty tons and scaled 19,600 feet of lumber.

The giant was a spruce. It was seventy-eight feet long, seven feet in diameter at the butt-end and sixty-eight inches in diameter at the top. Scaled as five sixteen-foot logs, it is estimated to have contained over 19,600 feet of lumber.

A. H. Powers says that he does not think a log of anywhere near this size was ever hauled on a train before.

WHITE SLAVER IS SENTENCED

Chas. M. Butts, Formerly of Eureka and Coos Bay, Given Three Years.

The following from a Portland paper will be of interest on Coos Bay on account of the principals in the case having been in Marshfield for some weeks a year ago last spring and because Marshal Carter was a witness in the two trials in federal court at Portland:

"Charles M. Butts, found guilty of white slavery Wednesday night by a jury in the United States District court was sentenced by Judge Wolverton to serve three years in the government penitentiary at McNeil's Island. On a former trial of this case the jury disagreed, standing 8 to 4 for acquittal. It was shown that Butts had brought Nellie Sams from Eureka, Calif., to Astoria. In this trial testimony was presented to the jury which was not admitted at the first trial. The jury deliberated five hours, and then recommended Butts to the mercy of the court.

"In pronouncing sentence Judge Wolverton drew attention to the fact that the girl is 17 years of age and unsophisticated, while Butts is 43, with a family of growing children. He is a grandfather."

FISH DEAL IS TOLD IN COURT

Capt. Reynolds Sues Southern Oregon Company for Part of Cost of it.

An echo of a fishing combine on Coos Bay is contained in a suit that has just been instituted in Justice Pennock's court by Capt. J. J. Reynolds vs. the Southern Oregon Co. Capt. Reynolds is suing for \$250.

He alleges that last summer he and the Southern Oregon Company entered into an agreement whereby they were to pay F. S. Dow \$500 to retire from the fishing business on Coos Bay. Capt. Reynolds alleges that he paid the amount and Mr. Dow retired from the fishing business. Then, he claims, the Southern Oregon company refused to pay its share of the bonus paid to get F. S. Dow out of the competition in the local fishing trade.

MILL IS CLOSED Acme Plant to Supply Material for Railroad Work Later

ACME, Ore., June 1.—The local plant of the Wendling-Johnson lumber company of San Francisco, is closed down for some repairs, although there is fully a month's orders ahead for local consumption. It is understood that as soon as the mill starts again it will start on a large order for ties and bridge timbers for the Southern Pacific's Eugene-Coos Bay line, which turns south at this point.

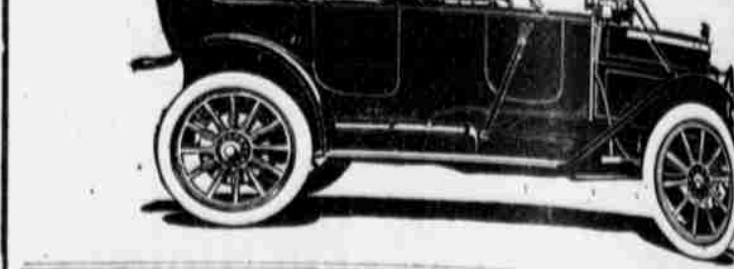
