CLOSE FINISH IN MARSHFIELD

Bandon Defeated By Rally In Ninth Inning Here Yesterday.

RUMOR IS DENIED
 Capt. Landers of the Marshfield team stated this afternoon that the rumor going around that Umpire Liljeqvist had announced that he was going to give yesterday's game to Bandon with a score of one to nothing on the ground that Marshfield had changed its batting order and on account of the alleged interference at the home plate was without foundation. Mr. Landers said that the batting order was not changed, two new men put in the game having batted in place of their predecessors. Neither of these had anything to do with the scores deciding the game. He said that he had not been officially notified that Bandon would protest the game although he had heard they would.

With a garrison finish, Marshfield yesterday afternoon took the initial game of the season from Bandon by a score of 2 to 1. Bandon scored its lone run in the fifth inning and Marshfield once or twice had come near scoring but not until the last half of the ninth did they get the necessary batting rally to cross the plate.

Burke started off with a pretty hot back of center, Landers hit an easy one as a sacrifice but it not only advanced Burke but landed himself safely in first. For the first time during the game the Marshfield rooters worked up some enthusiasm and it was perhaps due to this that Craig weakened a little and his support went up in the air for the first time during the game. McKeown hit to left field and Pierce's error let Burke score. Landers going to third. Geo. Johnson followed with a nice safe hit, scoring Landers. This terminated the game.

Bandon at the close of the game was threatening to protest it, alleging that the crowd had interfered in the play that let Burke score and also claiming that the batting order had been changed. Umpire Liljeqvist tried to keep the crowd back and was incensed at the manner in which they crowded the lines, the rooters having let their enthusiasm carry them too far. The protest will probably come up at the next meeting of the league as President Baxter will scarcely attempt to decide it although he was on the ground yesterday.

Burke Was Star.
 Up to the finish, the game was rather slow and not a particularly interesting one. The one redeeming feature was the stellar work of Mike Burke's Marshfield's shortstop. He was there all the time, covering a large territory and accepting every chance. Only once did he fumble and then he saved himself by a good throw. Not only did he accept five chances for put-outs and three for assists, but he led off in a pretty double play and it was his hit that started the batting rally in the ninth that won the victory, he being the first Marshfield man to cross the plate.

Craig pitched a good game for Bandon, his only signs of weakening coming in the ninth. Whether he got stage fright or whether it was just one of those psychological moments in baseball for Marshfield was hard to tell.

Johnson pitched a good consistent game for Marshfield, although he did not have as good support as did Craig. Two or three bad errors in his support were rather disheartening to him but he pulled himself together after each of them.

Both teams were apparently weak at stick work.

In the seventh inning, Briggs was substituted for Woods in left field and Jay Doyle for Jim Cowan in right field. Neither had a chance. They were put in by Capt. Landers merely to give as many of his men as possible opportunity to get some real practice.

Eastside Badly Beaten

Coquille defeated Eastside by a score of sixteen to nothing in seven innings. Eastside was handcapped by the failure of Robinson, their regular pitcher to show up. Manager Whitty had been relying wholly on Robinson as the rest of the team knew and when he failed to show up, the whole team fell into the dumps. Manager Whitty stated today that he would be better prepared next time and says the Eastside team may be expected to put up a really classy article of ball.
