BULKHEAD IS TO BE REPAIRED

Meeting at Chamber of Commerce Decides to Have Work Done at Once.

At a meeting of the Marshfield Chamber of Commerce this morning, steps were taken for the immediate Ferndale. The bulkhead was not as strongly constructed as it should have been and considerable sand and stit was washed out underneath it and is menacing the channel, not to areak of the damage to the fill and other losses.

The matter was called to the at-tention of Dr. McCormac of the Marshfield Chamber of Commerce by Engineer Leefe. Dr. McCormac Immediately took the matter up with John D. Goss, receiver for the Port. Commission. Mr. Goss was not sure that he had authority to go ahead with the repair work and Dr. McCormac called a meeting of the Chamber of Commerce.

After discussing the matter, a re-H. CLUE IN NOBLE CASE

Amount Stolen.

The identity of the party or parties who ransacked the L. M. Noble home yesterday afternoon and stole jewelry and other belongings to the value of about \$200 still remains a mystery. Marshal Carter is working on the case and has notified officers of nearby towns and hopes to be able to land the guilty parties soon.

The discovery of part of the missing articles wrapped up in a piece of cloth under a bed in the Noble home this afternoon added to the mystery. It is believed that this improvised sack was thrown under the bed when the miscreant heard a noise below and that he forgot to get it again before getting away. Owing to the nature of the articles taken, Mrs. Noble is under the impression that the pilferers were youths.

The robbery is believed to have occured about 3:30 yesterday afternoon. Mrs. Noble left the house at 3 o'clock to attend a tea at the home of Mrs. Mary McKnight. Mrs. Arthur McKeown called at the Noble home about 3:30. She rang the door bell but no one answered. She thought she heard some one walking repair of the bulkhead in Front of in the upstairs room and went around to the back door, thinking that Mrs. Noble did not hear the bell. She again heard some one walking in the upstairs room but got no response to her knock.

Less than a half hour later, Mrs. Jas. Cowan, Jr., called at the Noble home. She is a relative. She opened the door, expecting to find her sister. Miss Maud Noble, there. She called but no one answered and she left.

When Mrs. Noble returned about 5 o'clock she found the house topsyturvy. Trunks had been opened and their contents strewn on the floor, Bureau drawers had been ransacked and even the beds were overturned, the pilferers having searched under the mattresses. Many valuable papers had been handled but were not taken. A few papers of considerable value but which are protected by being recorded are missing. Nearly all of the silverware had been molested but little if any of it was taken. Considerable jewelry was taken, including a Biltmore ring engraved "B. F. S. REDUCE AUTO BAND CONCERT

> City Attorney Goss last evening was instructed by the council to draft an ordinance limiting the speed of automobiles in the city to ten miles per hour. The present speed limit of the fire limits and eight miles per hour within the fire limits,

> It was brought up by a report City Street Inspector Lawhorne that the speeding autos were raising havoc with the plank streets. Mr. Lawhorne said that the machines were tearing up the plank faster than he could spike them down. Last week, he expended \$25 for spikes for South Broadway.

Not only the damage to the streets but the danger of the speeding ma-chines was discussed. Marshal Carter reported that he had been informed that some of the machines had speeded upto forty-nine miles per hour Sunday. He said he had arrested eight.

Whether the state law or an ordi-nance should be invoked was a question raised but it was finally decided to amend the present ordinance and reduce the speed limit to a point so that there will be no question about ability to convict the violators.

To License Autos

Hugh McLain appeared before the
council last night and inquired if there was not some way of licensing autos so that the local machines would be protected from outside autoists coming in here on celebrations and participating in the harvest. He said the matter had come up at the Chamber of Commerce in discussing the Fourth of July plans, the local autoists having agreed to contribute toward the celebration providing they would be assured that outside machines would be kept out.

City Attorney Goss said that outside machines could not be taxed or licensed unless the local ones were. He suggested that the autos for hire be required to pay an annual license and this would prevent outside machines coming in here for a day or


