

MANY PLAN TO ENTER CONTEST

Prize Essay Offer of Fire Patrol for School Children Arouses Interest.

The prize essay contest which has been inaugurated by the Coos County Fire Patrol Association has created much interest among the school children of the county. W. J. Conrad, secretary of the association, states that he has already received a number of essays.

It has been arranged to have the School Superintendents of Marshfield, Coquille, North Bend, Myrtle Point and Bandon act as the judges of this contest, and they will meet at Coquille on October 5th to award the different prizes. In submitting their essays, the pupils should not sign their names, but write them on a separate piece of paper and enclose them in a sealed envelope and forward same, together with their essay, to W. J. Conrad, secretary of the Coos County Fire Patrol Association, 200 Coke building, Marshfield. This contest is open to all the school children throughout the county. If any of them have not received a copy of the pamphlet "The Ambitious Tree," which has been distributed among the schools by School Supervisor Dr. J. T. McCormac, they can secure copies by calling on or writing Mr. Conrad.

In all the prizes will total \$50. The school children will be divided into two classes, one for the high school and one for the grade pupils. The first prize in the high school contest will be \$10, second prize \$5, and five \$1 prizes will be awarded to the next best papers. In the grades the first prize will be \$10, the second \$5, the third \$3, the fourth \$2, and ten \$1 prizes will also be awarded.

The subject of the essay is "Protection of Our Forests From Fire," and the pupils can handle this subject in any manner they see fit. All that is required is their views as to the proper manner of protecting the forests of this county from fire. The essays shall not exceed 2000 words, and as the contest will end on October 1, the essays should be mailed or delivered before that time.

A. E. MORTON IS ENDORSED

North Bend Mothers' and Teachers' Club Favor Him for Director
A special meeting of the Mothers' and Teachers' Club of North Bend was called yesterday for the purpose of considering several matters of business that had come up. Nine members were present at the meeting, four of whom were voters. The meeting considered the selection of a successor to Mr. Stevens on the school board in place of Mr. Owen Moore, who was formerly endorsed by the club but who is prevented by recent business affairs from accepting the position.

Mr. A. E. Morton was finally chosen. Mr. Morton is a man of education and has a considerable interest in school matters. The club will heartily endorse him for the place. The selection of Mr. Kern for director was also discussed, but as Mr. Kern is already on the city council and as the city council is busy building railroads, it was decided that he would not be able to give the time that Mr. Morton could. It was also reported that personally Mr. Kern did not desire the nomination but that his friends had urged upon him.

MANY PUPILS FAILED

Returns From State Eighth Grade Exam Nearly All In.
SALEM, Ore., June 4.—With seven counties yet to hear from reports from counties in the state with relation to the eighth grade examinations show that 2598 pupils were successful in the examination. The state superintendent estimates that when the reports from the other counties are in they will show an additional number of 393, making a total of 1991. Taking the reports on hand as a basis he estimates that not more than 20 per cent of the students taking the examinations failed.

FINE WORK BY DREDGE OREGON

Removed 88,165 Yards of Dirt From Bay—Cost Less Than Four Cents Per Yard.

During the month of May, the Dredge Oregon pumped 88,165 cubic yards of dirt from the Coos Bay channel between the Cold Storage dock and the old stave mill. The cost of the dredging, exclusive of handling the shore pipe, was less than four cents per yard.

These figures are taken from a report made by Engineer F. E. Leeffe to the Marshfield Chamber of Commerce and to Major Morrow. The Chamber of Commerce is defraying the expenses of the work outside of the government project.

The report shows that of the dirt covered a distance of approximately 3,700 feet, most of the way digging it 150 feet wide and the balance 100 feet wide. Much of the time, the dredge was cutting through very soft mud and had to dig deeper and wider than was estimated in order to insure the channel being maintained at the proper depth.

Expense Divided
The total cost of operating the dredge during the month was \$2,103.01.

The reports show that of the dirt removed, 52,765 yards was taken from outside of the government project. This is about sixty per cent of the month's work and the Chamber of Commerce consequently has to stand sixty per cent of the expense or \$1,861.80.

The present work is about half completed and may be finished this month. The original estimate was that 170,000 yards of dirt was to be removed. Of this, about 120,000 yards was outside the government project. Approximately 100,000 yards has been removed, leaving in the neighborhood of seventy or eighty thousand yards yet to be taken out.

Engineer Leeffe states that the reason that the big volume of dirt taken out does not make a greater showing behind the bulkheads was because the bulkhead allowed considerable of the dredgings to filter back into the Bay.

The Oregon this afternoon or tomorrow morning will begin pumping into the bulkhead on the North Bend portion. Guy Latlin will have charge of the pipe-line there under H. C. Noble who has charge of the fill for L. J. Simpson.

Work on Coquille.

Engineer Leeffe reports that good progress is being made on the blasting work on the lower Coquille. A number of rocks have been taken out of the Bandon harbor and it is hoped to get all the worst obstructions or dangers removed. The government appropriated \$1200 for this work and all of this has not been spent. The citizens of Bandon have placed a couple of thousand dollars additional at the disposal of Mr. Leeffe to be used when the government money is all expended. The work is in charge of Roy Rozell of Empire and Mr. Leeffe pays high tribute to the efficient work he is doing there.

Since Inspector Kelly resigned, Donald M. Charleston has had supervision of the Coquille work.
