WORK FOR SANE FOURTH Boy Scouts Prepare List of Wholesome Activities. NEW YORK, June 6.—The leaders of the Boy Scout movement are co-operating with the boys through the country in a plan to abolish the barbaric method of celebrating the Fourth of July which has cost so many lives. They are working for a "sane Fourth" with celebrations that promise fun for the boy, patriotic exercises and the proper appreciation of the independence of the country. They want to do away with the use of firecrackers. Boy Scouts of America all over the United States have promised help in doing away with firecrackers and the use of revolvers. Troops in various parts of the country have voted not to use firecrackers or to participate in any dangerous celebrations. Lee P. Hamner, of the Russell Sage Foundation, member of the executive board of the Boy Scouts of America, has prepared for James E. West, chief scout executive, figures showing the value to the boy of the "Sane Fourth Campaign," and also has prepared a list of activities which the boys can enjoy on Independence day. Speaking first of the importance of the "sane Fourth," Hamner says: "Three years ago the campaign for a better celebration of the Fourth of July was started. Only few cities took up the movement that year. The number of casualties on Independence day totaled 5307 throughout the United States. The next year 51 cities planned 'sane' programs, with the result that casualties dropped nearly 50 per cent, the total being 2923. Last year 161 cities had celebrations according to the new plan, with the result that the accidents were again decreased by nearly 50 per cent, amounting to only 1603. This practical progress, resulting in the saving of hundreds of lives, has so impressed the American people that there is little doubt but that the old barbarous 'Fourth' will rapidly disappear and a bigger and better 'Fourth' will take its place. "The chief object of the Boy Scouts is to do a good turn for some one each day. Possibly it might be well to go a step further and have an understanding that, just as each scout is committed to do a good turn for some one each day, so also each troop of scouts might undertake, as a body, to do a good turn for the community in which they live, at least once each year. This would be both personal service and community service." Hamner and West want the Boy Scouts to co-operate with the Mayor or the head of the city, arranging patriotic exercises, parades, athletic games and the fireworks celebration at night. The Boy Scouts are planning games and other festivities out in the woods in place of a day in the city or towns with firecrackers. Plans are on foot to have historic pageants, barbecues, regattas and Boy Scout games.
