The deceased was born in Iowa and crossed the plains to the west when but two years of age. At the time of her death she was over 67 years of age. For over 35 years she has resided in Coos County, most of that time on a ranch a few miles above town.

SALEM, Ore., June 5.—Following is the theory embodied in the compensation act which is now being drafted by a commission and which is to the effect that every industry should be made liable to and provide for taking care of its maimed and wounded.

The Governor takes the position that the liquor business is responsible for a large per cent of the insane now confined in the asylum.

Included in the measures would also be morphine fiends and those addicted to other drugs, but just whether he would make the liquor interests or those more directly responsible for their condition liable for their support does not yet seem clear.

NEW BUOY MARKS REEF

Manzanita Places Danger Signal Off Curry County.

The Port Orford Tribune says: The lighthouse tender Manzanita lay in our harbor at Port Orford last Tuesday and Wednesday nights, having placed the big whistling buoy in position near Fox Rock, near the Port Orford reef.

The new buoy is a combination flash-light and whistling effect and is an alternating affair. The buoy weighs 11 tons and it requires the finest weather for placing it.

The Manzanita has aboard Lighthouse Inspector Henry L. Beck, and he inspected the Arago lighthouse on Saturday, finding Keeper W. S. Denning's business and conditions in excellent shape.

The new style buoy is supplied with acetylene gas for lighting and the charge consists of 4000 pounds of carbide. The machinery of the buoy must be very exact, since the charge is planned to light the buoy for a period of one year without replenishing.

J. A. SMITH NAMED AGAIN

Coos County Fire Warden Reappointed—Efficient Work Planned.

J. A. Smith, of Marshfield, Oregon, has been reappointed by the State Forester as Supervising Warden for Coos County. He will have charge of all State, County and private patrol work in this County, and co-operate with Forest Supervisors of the National Forests to the greatest possible extent.

It is hoped that residents of the County will give him their hearty support and consult him in regard to burning permits, etc., of a local nature. He will be in touch with all local wardens and will gladly refer requests for information to the warden nearest you for any information or assistance he may be able to give.

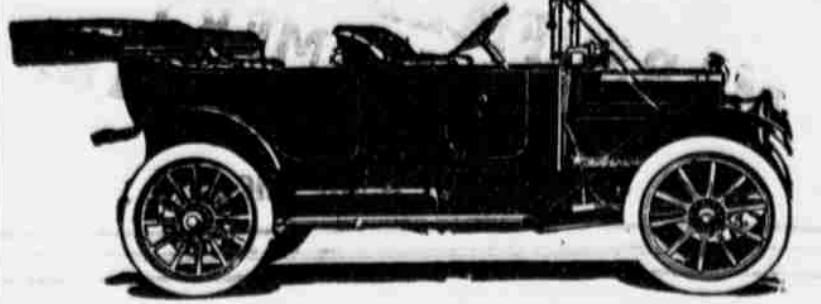
