#### NEW BUOY MARKS REEF

Manzanita Places Danger Signal Off Curry County. The Port Orford Tribune says:

The lighthouse tender Manzanita lay in our harbor at Port Orford last Tuesday and Wednesday nights, having placed the big whistling buoy in position near Fox Rock, near the Port Orford reef.

Port Orford reef. The new buoy is a combination flash-light and whistling effect and is an alternating affair. The buoy weighs 11 tons and it requires the finest weather for placing it. This buoy flashes for five seconds and then remains dead for that time, while the whistling is kept up con-stantly. The light is aupplied by a stantly. The light is supplied by a new gas arrangement and is so ar-ranged that it loses little of its pow-er in the day time, as the light is

Clash Between Strikers and Police At Newark, N. J. (By Associated Press to Coos Bay




