

Outside Bulkhead-The Dredge Oregon today is pumping in on the shore between the old stave mill and Kinney dock where no bulkhead was It is claimed that a rocky shoal along the bank made it difficult or impossible to put in a bulkhead but many are complaining because the pipeline is not turned to one side of this space so that it will pump in behind the bulkheads that Underwear, per garment. . . have been constructed.. Engineer Leefe who has charge of the dredge has repeatedly urged that haste be made in the construction of the bulkhead so that it would not be necessary for the dredge to pump on the tide flats. Receiver Goss of the Port Commission thinks that the Dredge should pump in behind the bulkheads that have already been built, saying that it would not require much more pipeline to do this.
