VILLISCA, Iowa, June 10.—Joseph Moore, a leading Villisca business man, his wife and four children and two women supposed to be Mrs. Van Gilder and her daughter, relatives of the Moores, were found murdered in their beds today in the Moore home, their heads crushed to a pulp.

TWO BATTLESHIPS SENT TO HAVANA

United States Sends Two Men-of-War From Key West Today—Situation on Island More Serious.

MRS KNOX IS GIVEN DECREE

Judge Coke Grants Divorce Petition Against Former Marshfield Pastor.

Saturday evening, Judge Coke handed down a decree granting Mrs. J. T. M. Knox a divorce from the Rev. J. T. M. Knox. The decree followed an agreement entered into earlier in the day by the attorneys of the two.

The agreement provided for the disposition of the property. It also specified that Mrs. Knox strike out from her petition the charges that Rev. Knox was addicted to the excessive use of liquor and to the use of profane language.

In the decree, Mrs. Knox is given the custody of their son and daughter. No alimony is allowed, the property division having taken place of that.

This marks the culmination of the Knox family troubles which are understood to have been of long duration. Following his resignation from his pastorate and Mrs. Knox filed a cross petition. The matter has been pending for some time.

Mrs. Knox and children expect to leave at once for the home of her parents in the East. Rev. Knox has not announced his plans for the future.

All were murdered in their beds. Moore was manager of an implement concern and a leader in business and social circles.

CUBAN VIEW OF IT Little Disposition to Discuss Coming of U. S. Vessels

AMERICANS ARE ATTACKED Cuban Rebels Repulsed Near Santiago by U. S. Marine

Mainwaring and engaged in guarding the El Cuero mines were attacked today by insurgents who were repulsed after much firing. There were no casualties among the marines and the loss to the insurgents is not known.

VESSELS SAIL TODAY Battleship and Cruiser Sail Presumably for Havana

(By Associated Press to Coos Bay Times.) KEY WEST, June 10.—The battleship Rhode Island and the cruiser Washington left harbor with sealed orders today, presumably for Havana.

The Collier Mars followed the Rhode Island and Washington just before noon. It may be used as a dispatched boat. It is reported. Threats of resignation by President Gomez as the result of the sending of American warships to the island are rumored among Cubans here.

RUSH SURVEY TO ROSEBURG

F. A. Haines and Party Working That Way—No News of S. P. Contracts.

ROSEBURG, Ore., June 10.—The Roseburg Review says "F. A. Haines who made a railroad survey between Coos Bay and Roseburg over two years ago, is again in the field with a crew of 15 or 20 men, so Al Creason, of this city, is informed. He was in communication with Mr. Haines by telephone this week and has this information from him direct. He is now working this side of Myrtle Point and is coming toward Roseburg. Who is backing his movements at present is not known. The equipment which Mr. Haines stored in Roseburg when he completed his former work has been sent to him by Mr. Creason. With this and the other engineering parties in the field further developments will be awaited with unusual interest."

IS HELD FOR POISONING MAN

A. R. Carey, Pasco Contractor, Arrested for Killing Cashier Christianson.

(By Associated Press to the Coos Bay Times.) PASCO, Wash., June 10.—A. R. Carey, a contractor, was arrested early today on a warrant charging the murder of Henry E. Christianson, cashier of the bank of Pasco, and a member of the Pasco city council by poison. Christianson died on a Spokane, Portland and Seattle train June first after drinking from a flask of whiskey which is thought to have contained strychnine. Carey was taken to Ritzville early today to be held pending an investigation. He came to Pasco from Walla Walla two years ago and has been prominent in business affairs here.

PLAN TO CALL RAILWAY STRIKE

Train Men and Engine Men of Pennsylvania and Erie to Vote on Question.

PHILADELPHIA, June 10.—A committee representing the Order of Conductors and Trainmen and Brotherhoods of Firemen and Engineers on the Pennsylvania Railroad East of Pittsburg and the Erie in a dispute over certain working arrangement today sent out a call for referendum vote on the question of giving the committee power to call a strike. About 25,000 men are said to be involved.

President Given Indiana Delegation by National Committee Today.

VOTE OF THIRTY-ONE TO THIRTEEN ON BALLOT

Col. New and Chas. K. Fairbanks Among Those Seated by Committee.

(By Associated Press to the Coos Bay Times.) CHICAGO, June 10.—A postponement of the hearing of the contest in the fourth California district today brought to high intensity the heated conflict between the Taft and Roosevelt factions in the Republican National Committee.

The vote of 38 to 13 by which the postponement was effected on motion of Senator Crane of Massachusetts drew beyond any possible doubt the lines between the factions.

The negative votes were Knight of California, Borah of Idaho, Burnam of Kentucky, Wight of Louisiana, Kellogg of Minnesota, Littauer for Flanigan of Nevada, Ward of New York, Capers of South Carolina, Thorson of South Dakota, Lyon of Texas, Loone of Utah, Rogers of Wisconsin, and McCoy of the Philippines.

The committee then took up the case of the four delegates-at-large in Indiana. It was expected that the Indiana cases and perhaps those from Kentucky would be finished today.

The Arizona cases were postponed until Wednesday. In the Indiana case, the committee again gave a decision for sitting the Taft delegates at large (four delegates) making 72 contested delegates given to the Taft side so far. The four from Indiana are the first elected from the north, the other 68 being from Alabama, Arkansas, Florida and Georgia. The vote on the Indiana roll call was unanimous—52 to 0. Col. New did not vote.

The Indiana delegates thus confirmed are Col. Harry S. New, ex-Vice President Charles W. Fairbanks, Representative James E. Watson and Joseph D. Oliver of South Bend. The defeated contestants are ex-Senator Albert J. Beveridge, Edward M. Lee, Lawrenceburg; ex-representative Frederick K. Landis, of Loganport, and Charles H. Campbell, of Shelbyville.

The first Indiana district's two delegates were also given to Taft by a unanimous vote. The third Indiana district two delegates also went to Taft. The contest in the fourth Indiana district was withdrawn, crediting Taft with two more delegates.

BOOST FOR CUMMINS Senator Kenyon of Iowa in Charge of Colleague's Campaign.

(By Associated Press to Coos Bay Times.) CHICAGO, June 10.—The Standard of Senator A. B. Cummins of Iowa for the republican presidential nominee was raised today by his colleague, Senator Kenyon, who arrived from Iowa full of enthusiasm for the Hawk-eye candidate. Cummins has now ten delegates pledged to him. Before the end of the week, the Iowans expect more than one thousand other enthusiastic boosters to be here to demonstrate their fealty to Cummins.
