HOMESTEAD BILL SIGNED BY PRESIDENT

WASHINGTON, June 10—The three-year homestead bill, so ardently fought for by Senator Borah of Idaho, was signed by the President.

The new measure provides that the homestead period be reduced from five years to three years and entrymen are permitted leave of absence of not to exceed five consecutive months each year, they being required to notify the local land office when they leave the land and the date of their return.

A cultivation clause is incorporated which requires the entrymen to cultivate not less than one-sixteenth of the area of his entry the second year and one-eighth the third year, before receiving a patent. The bill will apply to all entries, including enlarged homestead entries and all pending entries.

Entrymen who have not yet received a patent will have the privilege of completing their proof under the three-year bill or continuing under the old law as they may prefer.

WILSEY WIRES ABOUT OFFER

Announces MacArthur, Perks People Will Make Headquarters in North Bend.

H. C. Diers of North Bend yesterday received a telegram from Wm. J. Wilsey, original projector of the Summer roads and now associated with the MacArthur, Perks Company which holds the contract for constructing the Southern Pacific's line to Coos Bay, intimating that there would be activity on this end of the road soon.

Mr. Wilsey wired that the MacArthur, Perks company had accepted North Bend's offer of free dockage for material and equipment during the construction of the road and would make their headquarters in North Bend. He also stated that General Superintendent Tinkler of the MacArthur Perks company would be on the Bay soon.

Mr. Wilsey did not state anything about the sub-contracts on the road. No one here has received any definite news about them but it is presumed that the coming of Mr. Tinkler indicates that it will be settled soon.
