## MARSHFIELD LOST 5 TO 2

Coquille Takes Sunday's Game on Home Grounds—Good Crowd Out.

Coquille defeated Marshfield yesterday at Coquille by a score of 5 to 2. Three of Coquille's scores were made in the first inning, after which it was closely contested throughout. Marshfield started with hard luck. First Baseman Landers was detained in Marshfield until the Breakwater sailed and had to go to Coquille by auto and did not reach there until after the first inning. McKeown was substituted at first. He failed to connect with a speedy one which went wild and Coquille scored three runs. Both Collier and Johnson pitched good ball. Collier struck out 11 and Johnson seven, but the Coquille aggression is much stronger with the stick than Marshfield.

Marshfield tried out the hit and run game, but it failed to avail the result that Capt. McCutcheon had anticipated, largely due to the lack of practice on it. Collier, of Coquille, got the only long hit of the game, a two-bagger which Cowan would have probably stowed away had it not been for a ditch which prevented him getting back under it.

Next Sunday Marshfield will play North Bend and Eastside. The Marshfield-Eastside game will probably be played at North Bend in the morning and the North Bend-Marshfield game in Marshfield in the afternoon, although this is not certain. J. W. Gardiner, who umpired yesterday's game at Coquille, caused some complaint from both sides by his decisions on bases. There was no charge of favoritism, but merely errors in judgment. This has resulted in talk of having two umpires for each game, but it is feared this will prove a little too expensive.

Marshfield showed some improvement in fielding yesterday over a week ago. Two pretty doubles were pulled off, the first—Landers to Norman Johnson, and the second George Johnson to Burke.

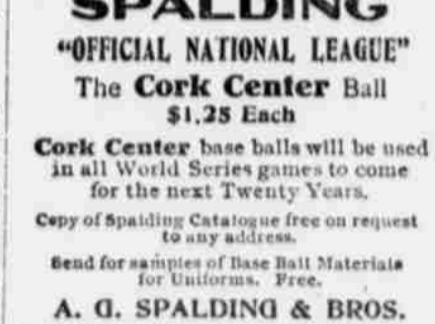
