Dr. Mann's new residence on Abernathy street is nearing completion and will be a very cozy little home when finished. John F. Bane left on the Bandon as a guest of Mr. Burgess of the Estabrook Co. Mr. Bane goes to San Francisco for a ten days' trip and will purchase machinery for his mill on Sixes River. The mill will have a capacity of about 20,000 feet and will saw mostly Port Orford cedar. C. E. Bowman has commenced the construction of a fine seven room bungalow on his lots on Abernathy street. The house will be modern in every particular with basement and other conveniences. EXHIBIT OLD VESSELS. SAN FRANCISCO, Cal., June 11.—Word was received by the Panama-Pacific International Exposition that the three Caravels, the Santa Maria, the Pinta and Nina, which were features of the Columbian Exposition of Chicago in 1893 and which have been in the lake at Jackson Park, Chicago, are to be repaired and brought to San Francisco by the Knights of Columbus of this country. The Santa Maria is an exact reproduction of the old Spanish vessel which carried Columbus on his tour of discovery in 1492 and in constructing it the plans that are preserved in the Spanish archives were followed. On their arrival in this city they will be placed in the Yacht Harbor which will be one of the interesting features of the World's Fair. FENCE EXPOSITION GROUNDS. SAN FRANCISCO, Cal., June 11.—It is estimated that the fence that is to enclose the Exposition will be two and one-half miles in length. At a meeting of the buildings and grounds committee held a few days ago, it was decided to have it nine feet high and not to permit advertising on it. The board of supervisors of the city and county of San Francisco have also been petitioned to close all streets within the Exposition site. HAS MANY HOTELS. SAN FRANCISCO, June 11.—The hotel men of San Francisco have pledged themselves to raise \$100,000 in addition to the \$150,000 they have already subscribed in aid of the 1915 World's Fair. San Francisco has 1237 hotels with 60,000 rooms. Ninety per cent of the hotels are less than four years old and are modern in every respect. STRANGE STORY OF MAN WHO STOOD STILL. AURORA, Ill., June 11.—The death of D. W. Stockwell, of this city, in Hawarden, Can., marked the passing of one of the quaintest characters in Illinois. He was known as the "man who stood still." As owner of one of the biggest stores outside of Chicago during the civil war he prospered. After the war he failed to keep abreast of the times and the same goods which he carried then still are on the shelves and show windows of the store. Five years after the war Stockwell still was making a profit. In ten years more the place was a curiosity shop, and has continued so. The hoop-skirt, barber-striped hose and jet jewelry continued a part of his stock. In later years he was the only one who entered the place except visitors to the city. He did no advertising. He had about \$10,000 worth of goods and settled down to wait for customers who never came. He was at business at 7 o'clock each morning and remained until 6 o'clock in the evening. He was 76 years old.

GREKS PLAN EXHIBIT. SAN FRANCISCO, Cal., June 11.—It is the intention of the Greeks of this country to reproduce in white marble on Telegraph Hill, which overlooks San Francisco Bay and is adjacent to the Exposition site, the famous Parthenon of Athens. Steps with this in view have already been taken by Consul General Richard de Fontana, of Greece, and he is receiving the co-operation of the exploitation department of the exposition. Consul General Fontana has cabled King George, of Greece, for permission to carry out the plans and is confident that the Greeks of this country and Europe will donate sums of money to bring about the building of this magnificent structure.
