# PITIFUL CASE IS FOUND HERE

Christ Wahl, Paralytic, Shipped Here Penniless by Idaho People.

Penniless among strangers and rendered practically helpless by paralysis and rheumatism, Chris Wahl, a German who arrived here recently from Harrison, Idaho, presented a pathetic sight here today. Provision for his temporary care by the county was made and it is likely that his story of a wrong suffered at the hands of supposed friends in Idaho will be investigated and an effort made to force restitution of part of the property which he claims to have been swindled out of.

Wahl was brought here on a launch from Isthmus Inlet today. He was discovered there trying to walk back to the Bay from Coquille and a Mrs. Moore, who resided near the head of the Inlet, discovered his condition. She gave him a dollar to get food with and called on Dr. McCormac to do something for the old man. Dr. McCormac took it up by phone with Judge Hall at Coquille and arranged to send Wahl to the County Infirmary to be cared for until something can be done about his case.

Wahl is not only physically infirm, but his ailments have evidently affected his keenness, to say the least. He had several letters on his person from E. W. Wheeler, of Harrison, Idaho, and the tenor of the letters would seem to indicate that Wheeler had shipped him to Coos Bay to get rid of him.

Wahl claims that he had a fine orchard and farm two miles from Harrison, Idaho. Four years ago, he was taken sick. He had no relatives and when it was found that it would be necessary to send him to the hospital, Wheeler, whom he regarded as a most reliable friend, came to him. Wahl says that Wheeler told him he would sell Wahl's place and for the money derived would take care of Wahl for the balance of his days. Wahl says a saloon man, named Geo. Roberts, got his farm and he signed over the check for \$2550 to Wheeler. Then he went to the hospital. That was about three years ago.

Wahl later went to Vancouver, Wash. The letters from Wheeler are addressed to Wahl at Vancouver, and all of them keep urging Wahl to come to Coos Bay. They state that Wheeler has sent \$12 to the agent of the Breakwater at Portland for a ticket to Wahl to Coos Bay. It states that the ticket was to be second class and that the Breakwater agent would give him \$5 in cash of which \$3 was to be given to the man who put him aboard the Breakwater. The letter speaks

# BETTER FERRY SERVICE PLAN

Transit May Run Later In Evening Between Marshfield and Eastside.

It is expected that the Coos County commissioners will soon provide for additional ferry service between Marshfield and Eastside in the near future. The plan is to provide for an extra trip on week days to be made at 6:30 and for additional service Saturday night.

The matter has been under consideration for some time. It was brought up by a petition but the additional service requested in the petition would necessitate the placing of an extra crew on the ferry which the county commissioners did not think was justified at this time.

Capt. Alex Hall of the ferry Transit is agreeable to the proposed plan for bettering the service, that is making a trip at 6:30 week day evenings and running up to about 9:30 Saturday evenings.

Capt Alex Hall reports that during the month of May the Transit carried 5199 passengers, 119 double teams, 220 single teams, 32 head of stock and 47 autos between Marshfield and Eastside.

about Wahl having friends in Coos County who would take care of him and also states that Wheeler has sent the Marshfield postmaster money to be turned over to Wahl on his arrival here.

Wahl says he has no friends here and he did not know the name of the man he was to meet in Marshfield. He also says that Postmaster Curtis told him that Wheeler did not send him any money.

One of the letters in an envelope addressed to Wahl is addressed to Roy Wiese, Vancouver, Wash., and refers to Wahl as not being of sound mind. He speaks of a friend in Marshfield but does not give his name and also says that Wahl imagines he is sick and insisted on remaining in bed.

Wahl is badly crippled and his story caused many expressions of sympathy for him.

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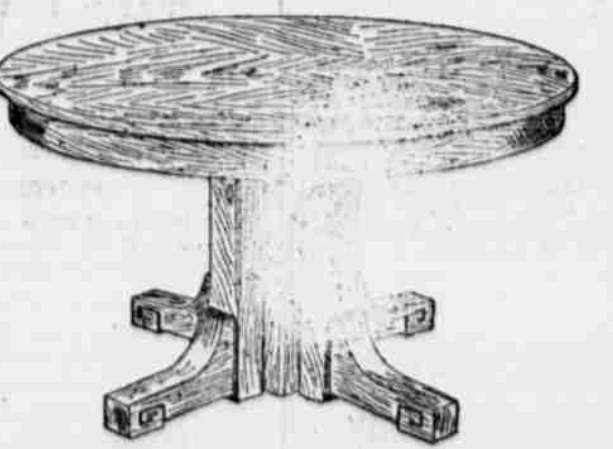
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
