RAIN up a child in the way he should go and when he is old he will not depart therefrom.

All human experience attests the wisdom of this scriptural proverb, though its observance is by no means co-extensive with its acceptance as a sound principle of life. Too many children are permitted to just "grow up" like weeds in an uncultivated field, without any special training or guidance. Not all of these, to be sure, "depart from the way they should go," for some, under favorable environment, or possessing a rich heritage of blood, find themselves in places of usefulness, but others, less fortunate, because a menace to organized society.

Whether or not it be true that the shortcomings of the home in former times, there can be no doubt that the tendency on the part of outside agencies more and more is in the direction of taking care of the boy.

For this work Marshfield should have a Y. M. C. A. This organization with its provision for physical development as well as moral, spiritual and intellectual training, would meet the needs of this growing city in taking care of the boys and young men, for whom at present there is no provision.
