COL ROOSEVELT TO PERSONALLY BE CENTER OF CHICAGO FIGHT

Expected to Personally Assume Charge of His Campaign There Now.

WILL TRY TO WIN SUPPORT OF DELEGATES

Follette's and Cummins' Delegations Sought—May Address Convention.

ROOSEVELT GETS 185; ROOSEVELT 15 (By Associated Press.) CHICAGO, Ill., June 15.—A summary of the contests to date follows: Total contests at outset, 254. Decided to date, 200. Taft delegates seated, 185. Roosevelt delegates seated, 15. Contests to be decided, 54.

CHICAGO, Ill., June 15.—The entire Republican convention struggle centered about Col. Roosevelt from the moment he alights from his train late this afternoon. It will be a power of political manipulation against the wits, strategy, staying powers of the Taft forces, win the nomination, Roosevelt must break Taft's ranks as they appear near the settlement of the delegate contests by the National Committee or win the support of the LaFollette and Cummins delegations or both. His followers are enthusiastic in their belief that he and they together will sweep the convention. Every delegate pertaining to the convention on Roosevelt's side from now on will be under his personal supervision. He has arranged no fixed program of activities for Col. Roosevelt. He is here but they count on getting in personal touch with a number of delegates counted mainly as Taft supporters but regarded as Roosevelt possibilities. On Monday night, Roosevelt is expected to address a mass meeting. The Colonel is expected to remain in Chicago until the conclusion of the annual convention. This in itself is a departure from the procedure of past candidates as to furnish food for speculation. It seems probable that he will insist, that he attends the convention, that he press the delegates in explanation of his attitude on the issues they have met.

Hope for Stampede. An address would give an opportunity for a stampedede of the variety that was feared even by Roosevelt himself four years ago. The Roosevelt followers are hoping such opportunity will arise.

The task of physical preparation for the convention practically is finished. A complete inner structure has been reared within the hall of the coliseum and its adjoining annex and anteroom. Tonight every chair of the 11,188 that are to accommodate delegates, alternates, candidates, respondents and a few favored private citizens will be in place. Back of the coliseum hall in the basement of the annex scores of telegraph instruments are already in place. Two telephone exchanges have been installed on the main floor of the annex. A temporary hospital with full surgical equipment has been constructed within easy reach of the convention auditorium and police headquarters have been opened in the rear of the hall.

COMMITTEE IS CALLED DOWN

Four Governors and Eight National Committeemen Indite Letter Today.

CHICAGO, June 15.—Demanding that the Republican National Committee rescind the "fraudulent action" in seating delegates, or bear the responsibility of assassinating the republican party, leaders of the Roosevelt forces including the governor of the states who urged Roosevelt to run for the nomination, sent a letter to Acting Chairman Roosevelt protesting the acts of the committee. The letter is signed by four governors and eight committeemen.

Roosevelt Declares En Route to Chicago He Will Battle Until the Finish.

CROWD WELCOMES HIM (By Associated Press.) CHICAGO, June 15.—Col. Roosevelt arrived late today and a tremendous crowd cheered the candidate as he stepped from the train.

TOLEDO, Ohio, June 15.—With Chicago only a few hours away, Col. Roosevelt just before the train reached this city today stated his determination to fight his opponents to the end. "I did not feel at liberty to refuse to come where the fight was being waged," he said. "My object in going to Chicago is perfectly simple." Here Roosevelt paused a moment, carefully choosing his words before he continued. "The actions of certain national committeemen have unfortunately made it evident that in this fight between plain people and the public men who should be their servants and who have attempted to be their masters, there is a concerted effort being made by professional politicians and the interests for which they stand deliberately to rob the people of the victory they have fairly won. When such was the case I could not remain away." "I'm a regular," said Col. Roosevelt in addressing a crowd at South Bend, Ind. "The fight does not make regularity."

READY TO BOLT CONVENTION

California Delegation Adopts Resolutions Indicating Readiness.

LUMBER INDUSTRY THIRD IN NATION

Assumes High Place in Industrial Life of United States According to Last Census Report.

WASHINGTON, June 15.—Lumber and timber manufacturers rank third in value among the products of industries in the United States according to 1912 statistics made public today by Director Durand. The figures

show 40,671 lumber and timber establishments and 784,989 persons engaged in the industry. The average number of wage earners was 695,019. The value of the products was \$1,156,128,747. The value added by the manufacture which is the difference between cost of materials and value of products was \$648,011,168.

Louisiana led in the number of wage earners and Washington in value of products \$89,154,825 and the value added by manufacture, \$51,275,954.

BOGUS CHECK MAN IS HELD

Chas. Bailey Bound Over to Grand Jury for Passing Worthless Paper.

Chas. Bailey, who was arrested late yesterday, was today bound over by Justice Penneck to the grand jury on the charge of forgery. He entered a plea of not guilty and his bond was fixed at \$500, which he was unable to furnish.

Bailey presented a very dispirited appearance when arraigned this morning and did not volunteer much information except that he recently came from California. He is about 30 years old.

Bailey is accused of securing \$33 from Emmerson Ferry of the Bianco bar on a bogus check. He secured \$15 from George Steinburn of the Brewery saloon on a worthless check for \$135 and he also secured \$25 from Proprietor Shrock of a North Bend saloon on another worthless check. He was apprehended in Shrock's place and Shrock recovered his money, leaving Bailey with about 60 cents.

The checks were supposed to be drawn by Henry Laird, who is supposed to live out on the old Coos Bay wagon road and were in Bailey's favor.

Besides those out on the bogus checks, D. L. Foote has quite a bill against Bailey for auto hire, Bailey having used an auto quite freely in celebrating on his "easy money." He claimed that Nightwatch Bill Shoupe was a friend of his, but when Shoupe was found, the officer disclaimed any knowledge of Bailey.

Bailey will be taken to the county jail at Coquille to await action by the grand jury.

TAFT'S MANAGER SAYS THE CONVENTION CAN'T BE STAMPED

TEXAS GIVEN TO TAFT TODAY

Contest for State's Delegates-at-Large Decided in President's Favor.

(By Associated Press to the Coos Bay Times.)

CHICAGO, Ill., June 15.—Over the dramatic protests of Cecil Lyon, National committeeman and Roosevelt leader, the Republican National committee today voted the eight Texas delegates at large into the Taft column. The vote followed a lively debate in which the Taft representatives from the Lone Star State accused Lyon of housing Texas Republicans through methods that recalled the rotten borough system in England and in which Lyon accused members of the contesting Taft delegation with having run for office on the Democratic ticket and having bolted the Republican ticket. The motion to seat the Roosevelt delegates at large was defeated, the demands for a roll call being refused. The Texas decision was followed by scenes of disorder outside the committee room where the wild cheering of several hundred Taft adherents mingled with hooting and groans by the Roosevelt supporters.

By unanimous decision the first Texas district's two delegates were credited to Taft. The second district's two delegates contest also was decided in Taft's favor.

The third Texas district's delegates contest was decided in favor of Roosevelt.

The fourth Texas district, two delegates was credited to Taft.

The fifth and seventh districts, two votes each were given to Taft.

The eighth Texas, two delegates, was credited to Taft.

The Tenth Texas district's two delegates were credited to Taft.

The Ninth Texas district's two delegates were given to Taft.

Director McKinley Declares They Cannot Be Bulldozed or Bluffed.

CLAIMS TAFT HAS IT ON THE FIRST BALLOT

Declares Roosevelt Lacks 78 votes of the Number Necessary.

(By Associated Press to Coos Bay Times.)

CHICAGO, June 15.—As a final precautionary measure against the advent of Col. Roosevelt and his expected activities among the delegates, Director McKinley of the Taft headquarters issued a statement containing a warning against "bluff, bulldoze and bluster" of the Roosevelt forces.

"From this time until the nomination of Wm. H. Taft for president by the Republican National convention," said the statement, "Every effort will be made by the followers of Roosevelt to sweep delegates off their feet by bluff, bulldoze and bluster. The coming of Roosevelt is a gala event among the rank and file of Roosevelt's followers but it will not change one vote in the Republican national convention.

"That body is already fireproof and non-stampedable and only one unthinking will see in the events of the next few days anything which seemingly disturbs the serenity of the situation. The deep undercurrent of republicanism which will characterize the control is as steady as the rock of Gibraltar and no word of mouth to a blatant act by any living man or men can prevent the certain renomination of Taft.

"Roosevelt still lacks 78 votes of a nomination available to his own managers while Taft will control the convention by a majority over all the first ballot.

"The work of framing the platform has been delayed until the arrival of Senator Root from Washington where he went to consult President Taft about certain planks."

CORNER SOLD TO LOCAL MEN

J. Albert Matson, Herbert Lockhart and J. V. Smeaton Get Fine Property.

Negotiations for the sale of the northwest corner of Front and Central by Capt. Adam Donaldson to the Matlock Investment company were concluded today. The property is about 50 x 50 feet and the purchase price is understood to have been \$16,500, a new record in Marshfield real estate values. The corner, however, is one of the best in the city.

The Matlock Investment company is composed of J. Albert Matson, Herbert Lockhart and J. V. Smeaton. Toots Noble held a ground lease on the corner and the present buildings on it which are occupied by Hillier's Cigar Stand, Parley's O. K. Barber Shop and W. J. Rust's Real Estate office, belong to him. Just as soon as this lease is terminated, it is understood to be the intention of the purchasers to erect a modern two-story brick or concrete building on the corner.

Capt. Donaldson has owned the property for a long time and makes a handsome profit on it. He retains the balance of the block's frontage on Central avenue. Rumors were current today of other real estate deals but none of them have been closed. Gow Why is said to have refused an offer of \$26,000 for his property at the southeast corner of Broadway and Commercial.

ORDERED OUT OF CUBA Rebel Leader Serves Notice on Whites to Leave Section.
