Vice-president and General Manager Hitchcock and General Superintendent Tinkler of the MacArthur Perks company accompanied by other representatives of the company and also by some other contractors left San Francisco on the Steamer Washington today for Coes Bay.

The above news came in a special message today from W. S. Scammell of San Francisco, general manager of the Steamer Washington, to The Times. In concluding his message, Mr. Scammell says "Hurrah for Coos Bay." Mr. Scammell was here last week on business and grew enthusiastic over the prospects here.

It is stated that owing to the high bids of the contractors for portions of the work, the MacArthur Perks company now plan to build practically all of the road themselves. They claim that the bids of the contractors on the sub-contracts were exces-

It is understood that Vice-president Hitchcock will now figure with Coos Bay contractors on sub-letting small portions of the work. If this can be done reasonably, it is under-stood that Mr. Hitchcock plans to sub-let as much of it as possible.

Assemble Equipment. is stated on good authority that the MacArthur Perks company has assembled considerable construction equipment at San Francisco ready for shipment here, the first consignment of this equipment will come on the Washington has not been stated.

Advises from Pueblo, Colo., are that considerable quantities of steel have already been shipped there for the Southern Pacific's Coos Bay-Eugene line. This steel, according to the understanding that C. J. Millis and Mr. Hitchcock had when they were on the Bay a few weeks ago, would go to Eugene, most of the rails being laid from that end. However, structural steel for bridges will probably be brought to Coos
