### BRIBE RUMORS SMOKESTACK IS 233 FT. TALL

Structure Being Erected at Smith Mill.

The concrete work on the new smokestack for the C. A. Smith mill engine room was started today and the immense tower will be one of the largest in the country, towering 233 feet over all when completed.

The foundation for the smokestack is on piling and is thirty-six feet square. The base of the smokestack proper will be eighteen feet in diameter and the top will be about

## TO CONTEST OVER DELEGATES

# AGAINST BOLT

Gov. Hadley and Gov. Deneen Opposed to Roosevelt Forces Quitting Convention.

(By Associated Press to Coos Bay

Times.)
CHICAGO, Ill., June 19.—Colonal
Roosevelt's lieutenants, including Gov. Hadley and Gov. Deneen, served notice today that they would not sanction a boit under any circum-stances. They made no secret of their position in this respect. On the other hand that Col. Roosevelt had ordered the withdrawal of his delegates from the convention if the credentials committee fails to unseat the vention opened for the second day. On every hand it was agreed that this development was certain to follow the approval of the National committee's action. It was also expected as another certainty that Roosevelt could not take from the convention some of his pledged delegates.

Roosevelt Forces Try to Unseat Ninety-Two Taft Men in Convention.

SEVERAL HOURS ARE GIVEN UP TO DEBATE

Several Near Riots Mark Discussion-Bitterness Manifested Often.

> TAFT LEADS AGAIN TODAY

(By Associated Press.) CHICAGO, III., June 19—The Taft forces won the only test of strength today by a vote of 563 to 510. The vote was taken on a motion to table a resolution which would prevent delegates whose seats had been contested from voting in contests. The Taft forces wanted to table it.

Watson's motion referring the Hadley resolution on contests to the credentials committee was adopted viva voce without division.

CHICAGO, June 19-With interest so intense as to almost preclude applause, the Republican National Convention at noon today was in the midst of a three hours' argument tested by the Roosevell faction but seated by the national committee. It seems likely the debate and vote on the question would last all af-

ternoon. It had been agreed in advance that there should be no parilamentary points of order against the Roosevelt motion, the Taft forces agreeing to fight the matter out be-

fore the delegates. Hot Times Started

Senator Hemenway of Indiana declared the work of the National Committee was fair and regular. He attacked the men who had signed the protest. "Why," he shouted, would you leave this matter to a man like T. C. Dupont of Delaware, representative of the powder trust?" He attacked Cecil Lyon of Texas whom he said controlled five thous-

and federal appointments. "How about Penrose?" came from Pennsylvanian. Shaking his fist 'n the faces of the delegation, Hemenway shouted, "Give me Penresa be-fore Flinn every time." Pennsylvani-Climbing over chairs ans went wild. and brandishing fists, Flinn among them, they yelled vituperation at the speaker. As the disorder continued, Chairman Root came to the front of the stage and pointing at Flinn shouted. "If the gentleman from Pennsylvania wishes to commend his cause to the just and honest members of the convention and the American people, he will cease to interfere with the delivery of reasonable and decent argument." Root was cheered.

The Indiana outbreak followed an assertion of Record's that in one district of Indianapolis, the returns were made up by officials without even opening the ballot boxes. Order was finally restored. No blows were struck.

At 1:35, an intermission of fifteen minutes was taken that the spectators might leave for the afternoon. No one leaving was allowed to return.
