Missouri Executive Suggested As Candidate for President Late Today.

DELEGATES IN WILD UPROAR 50 MINUTES

Chicago Woman Finally Starts Wave of Enthusiasm for Roosevelt.

CHICAGO, Ill., June 19.—James E. Watson, the Taft floor leader, took the platform in the Republican National convention late today in opposition to the Roosevelt program.

The high regard of the convention as a whole for Gov. Hadley had been apparent all day today.

Ohio, Nebraska, Massachusetts, California, Minnesota, Pennsylvania and South Dakota later joined, all cheering for Hadley and Watson.

The uproar lasted fully twenty minutes. In the midst of the ovation to Gov. Hadley, the Illinois delegates tried to start the refrain, "We Want Teddy," but it was hardly audible in the din.

The crowd continued to roar as the speaker at arms led Coleman from the platform.

A beautiful girl in the gallery started a picture of Roosevelt and evoked another tremendous ovation.

Gov. Deneen of Illinois moved an amendment to Hadley's resolution that no man whose seat was contested could sit in judgment of a case.

Roosevelt Forces Try to Unseat Ninety-Two Taft Men in Convention.

SEVERAL HOURS ARE GIVEN UP TO DEBATE

Several Near Riots Mark Discussion—Bitterness Manifested Often.

TAFT LEADS AGAIN TODAY

(By Associated Press.)

CHICAGO, Ill., June 19.—The Taft forces won the only test of strength today by a vote of 563 to 510. The vote was taken on a motion to table a resolution which would prevent delegates whose seats had been contested from voting in contests.

Watson's motion referring the Hadley resolution on contests to the credentials committee was adopted viva voce without division.

CHICAGO, June 19.—With interest so intense as to almost preclude applause, the Republican National Convention at noon today was in the midst of a three hours' argument on the motion of Governor Hadley of Missouri to "purge" the temporary roll call of ninety-two delegates contested by the Roosevelt faction but seated by the national committee.

It had been agreed in advance that there should be no parliamentary points of order against the Roosevelt motion.

HOT TIMES STARTED

Senator Hemenway of Indiana declared the work of the National Committee was fair and regular. He attacked the men who had signed the protest.

"How about Penrose?" came from a Pennsylvanian. Shaking his fist in the faces of the delegation, Hemenway shouted, "Give me Penrose before Flinn every time!"

The Indiana outbreak followed an assertion of Record's that in one district of Indianapolis, the returns were made up by officials without even opening the ballot boxes.

ROUTINE OF CONVENTION

Almost Entire Session Devoted to Bitter Debate Today
