LOCAL MAN HONORED

Henry Sengstacken Elected Vice President of Oregon Abstractors.

Henry Sengstacken returned today from Portland where he was attending the annual convention of the Oregon Association of Title Men. He was honored by being elected vice president of the association, Chas. H. Weder of Albany being elected president. One of the objects of the association is summed up as follows by an article in a Portland paper:

"Thousands of dollars are wasted each year in the State of Oregon straightening out titles to property that have been bungled by incompetent and poorly equipped abstractors," said W. C. Saunders, secretary of the Oregon Association of Title Men yesterday, "and to prevent this the Oregon Association of Title men has agreed not to recognize any man or company who has not a fully equipped abstract plant. Oregon is absolutely the worst state in the Union in this respect. Trouble is constantly occurring because some unqualified abstracter has made a mistake through lack of records and equipment and it must be stopped."
