PROFESSOR Emory C. Johnson told the senate committee on interoceanic canals at a recent hearing that it would cost \$31,000,000 a year to maintain the Panama canal after its completion. He estimated that the fortifications and the military force on the Isthmus will take \$15,000,000 annually out of the federal treasury. It will require about \$11,500,000 every year to pay the interest on the money invested in the canal. To operate the great waterway and keep it in good repair will call for about \$4,500,000 annually if Professor Johnson is correct.

**LAUNCH BIG VESSEL**

**Swayne & Hoyt to Have Large Lumber Carrier.**

SAN FRANCISCO, June 20.—With the launching of the new steel steamer Camino today at the Craig Shipyards at Long Beach, what is destined to be the largest lumber carrier of the Pacific coast will first settle into the waves. The Camino is being constructed for Swayne & Hoyt and when completed at the end of July will be used to ply in the coastwise lumber trade. In addition to having a capacity to carry 2,500,000 feet of lumber the vessel will be equipped to carry 160 passengers. The accommodations will be the best and entirely different from those on any other lumber carrier in the world. After the completion of the Panama Canal, the Camino will ply between the Atlantic and Pacific via the big ditch, conveying both passengers and lumber.

**WORK IN MALHEUR**

**Larger Force Busy on East and West Oregon Line.**

ONTARIO, Ore., June 17.—A construction crew consisting of six cars of draft horses and 11 cars of grading tools and implements arrived in Ontario Thursday and went on to Vale and the Malheur canyon. This was the construction outfit of R. G. Dunn, recently of Kansas, who has several miles of heavy grading contracted in the Malheur canyon. Besides this large outfit several heavy teams and a force of men have passed through Ontario the last week on the way to the canyon, where it is said that 3,000 men will soon be put to work to rush the grading of the Oregon & Eastern through the narrow pass.

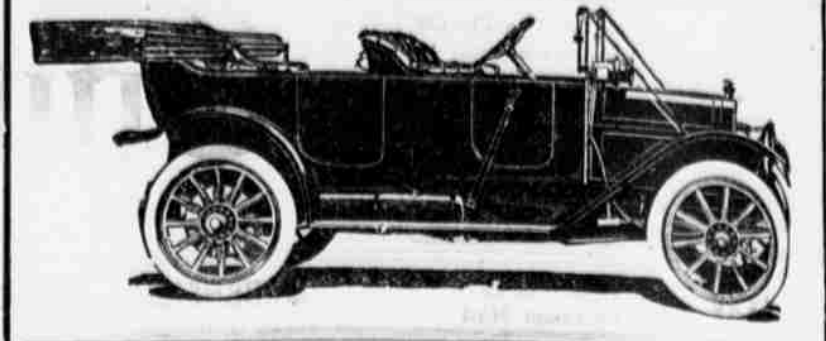
