ly handling the candidates of the president and ex-president will stick by their men to the finish if they can keep their following intact. But among the delegates already here there is a strong sentiment for a compromise, or rather "a harmony candidate," as they term it.

**Speech Makers**

The list of seconding speeches to President Taft's nomination was completed today by the selection of Dr. William Fletcher Penn of Atlanta, Ga. Dr. Penn is a negro and a delegate from Georgia. The other seconding speeches will be made by Senator W. O. Bradley of Kentucky and Nicholas Murray Butler of New York, after the president has been placed in nomination by Warren G. Harding of Ohio.

**Cummins and La Follette**

Some of the Cummins men waited on the La Follette people this afternoon with a view of sounding them as to a possibility of their getting together. The Cummins folks told the La Follette people that Cummins had the better chance of the two of drawing strength from Taft and Roosevelt, and that if the La Follette strength could be given to him it would mean his selection. But the La Follette people didn't see it, they said.

Senator W. S. Kenyon, who is to manage the Cummins candidacy, made the announcement that Representative Nathan E. Kendall would present Mr. Cummins' name. The Cummins crowd won't have a platform of their own, but Senator Kenyon said they would have a few planks to offer at the proper time. As to the chances of their candidate, people who visited the Cummins headquarters at the Congress hotel were cheerfully assured that it would come down to Cummins for a compromise about the fourth ballot.

**Borah for Cummins**

Senator Borah was prominently mentioned among the gossipers today as a probable dark horse for the presidential nomination. Notwithstanding positive declarations from leaders of the both sides that talk of compromise was foolish and that the fight must go to a finish between Taft and Roosevelt and "the principles" represented by them, there are many delegates and leaders who think that another man can win the convention crown.

**'BLUE SKY' LAW PETITION HERE**

Effort to Enact Statute Preventing Wildcat Corporations.

The Times has received from Secretary of State Olcott a copy of the Blue Sky bill which will be initiated at the November election. The bill, designed to protect purchasers of stocks and bonds and to provide for the thorough regulation and supervision of corporations, is modeled after the famous Blue Sky law of Kansas. The Oregon bill has been in the course of preparation for months and has been received and approved by some of the best lawyers and business men in the state. The administration of the corporation laws now costs about \$7000 per year. Under the new law the expense will

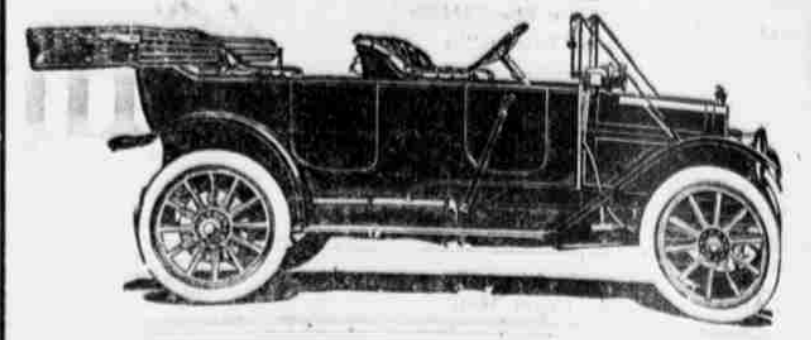
