

# DREDGE OREGON TO BE KEPT HERE

Government Decides Not to Take it to Washington Harbors This Year.

That the Dredge Oregon will not be taken from Coos County this year was the statement made by Major J. J. Morrow, in charge of the United States engineers, to John D. Goss in Portland a few days ago. While north, Mr. Goss called on Major Morrow in regard to harbor matters, as he is interested as receiver of the Port of Coos Bay.

Major Morrow informed him that there was little work to be done at the Washington harbors, the only government project there now being a comparatively small amount of work at Willapa Harbor. It is estimated that the work at Willapa harbor would cost about \$12,000 and Major Morrow decided that it would be cheaper and better to contract the work instead of running the hazard of moving the Oregon there from Coos Bay.

This is joyous news to Coos Bay but it will necessitate steps being taken soon to provide funds for operating the dredge. The government appropriation for harbor work here is understood to be practically exhausted. Mr. Goss stated that he did not believe that he would have much surplus in the Port of Coos Bay funds above what would be needed to finish the old projects and anyway it is doubtful if he would have the authority to expend money for new projects. This will probably mean that money will have to be raised by public subscription or by having property owners whose lowlands are filled pay for the improvement. This will probably be taken up soon by the Chamber of Commerce.

The Oregon will complete its present project early next month and then it will go to the lower Bay to remove the shoals there.

**Bar Dredge Hastened**  
Major Morrow also informed Mr. Goss that the final plans for the new bar dredge for Coos Bay had been approved at Seattle and that the construction of the big boat would be started immediately. It is expected to have it completed and ready for service early next year. Major Morrow stated that there was a good prospect of securing a reconsideration of the demand for the construction of the jetties at Coos Bay and intimated that he would favor their reconstruction.

**Hasten Mill Slough**  
Owing to the likelihood of the Dredge Oregon remaining here and not having any definite work ahead it is likely that the parties urging the filling of Mill Slough will try to hasten that project. The filling of Mill Slough would require an immense amount of filling and it is expected that the property owners would gladly pay the comparatively small cost of filling by the dredge. In addition to making the big improvement of the property, this dredging would make quite a start towards securing the turning basin in front of Marshfield which has long been advocated as a boon to shipping.

**Will Clear Channel**  
Engineer Lee has been authorized by Major Morrow to do considerable dredging in the lower Coquille as soon as the rock work there is completed. The rocks are now being removed from the channel, greatly improving the Bandon harbor. A shoal has been formed just above the G. W. Moore Lumber company's mill since the Oregon cleared the channel there a year ago. The removal of the shoal will be a great advantage to the mills at Randolph and further up the river. E. C. Johnson has been a prime mover in the endeavor to secure the river channel improvement there.

**On Picnic.**—The members of the A. N. W. Club and others are being entertained at a strawberry picnic by Mrs. C. H. Dungan at her home on South Coos River today. The party left here on a special launch early this morning.

# DOUBLE-HEADER NEXT SUNDAY

Marshfield and Eastside to Play at North Bend—Others at Bandon.

Next Sunday there will again be double headers played in the Coos County Baseball League, Marshfield and Eastside going to North Bend and Coquille and Myrtle Point to Bandon. So far, every team in the league has shown some class work, except perhaps the Eastside boys and likewise there has been some very ragged ball playing.

Next Sunday the Marshfield boys will have a chance to even up on North Bend for last week's contest and to set themselves right with the fans. There is no reason why the home team cannot play ball. So far as talent is concerned they have plenty of that. In summarizing the team there are no weak spots.

Roy Abbott behind the bat is a good steady man. He is well built, can stand the wear and tear of a catcher and there are none better in the league.

As pitchers Marshfield has two good men, Johnson and Sutton. Johnson has speed, curves and control and is a right hander. Sutton made good in the only test he has had so far. He is a lefty and he and Johnson together should make a fine combination.

On the bases there are a few weak spots. Landers is not excelled by any first baseman in the league. Briggs is young and has not had much experience but he is a willing worker. McCutcheon at third knows the game from a to z; he can hit the ball and is in an excellent position from which to captain the team.

Little need be said of Burke as short as everyone is aware of his stellar work. During the season he has not had an error and he has made a hit every game.

In the field, Cowan, G. Johnson and Langworthy are well able to cover their part of the garden. Cowan is probably the best stickler of the trio but the season is early and it is hard to tell who has the best batting eye.

"Taken all in all there is no reason why Marshfield should not be able to play ball, but that there is something wrong with the team no one will deny," said one of the fans today. "Capt. McCutcheon must be well aware of the fact. So is everyone. The team may be a little weak in batting but that is not the reason the home boys lost to Coquille and North Bend. The real trouble is that there is too much grumbling and rag chewing going on between the men. The majority of them know just a little too much about the game themselves to play under Captain McCutcheon. If they were given their just deserts they would be running a team of their own in big league company and when the major league teams run shy on captains they will find a good field here to supply the entire nation. Of course a team of captains cannot play ball any better than an army can fight that is composed of nothing but generals. Each man is a team himself, playing for himself and against the rest of the team. So far that has been the trouble with the Marshfield ball team. Of course there are exceptions, and it is an injustice to make all of the team suffer for the mistake of a part of the boys, but since the majority have gotten started on the wrong trail the rest will have to be willing martyrs in the fight that is being made for better base ball."

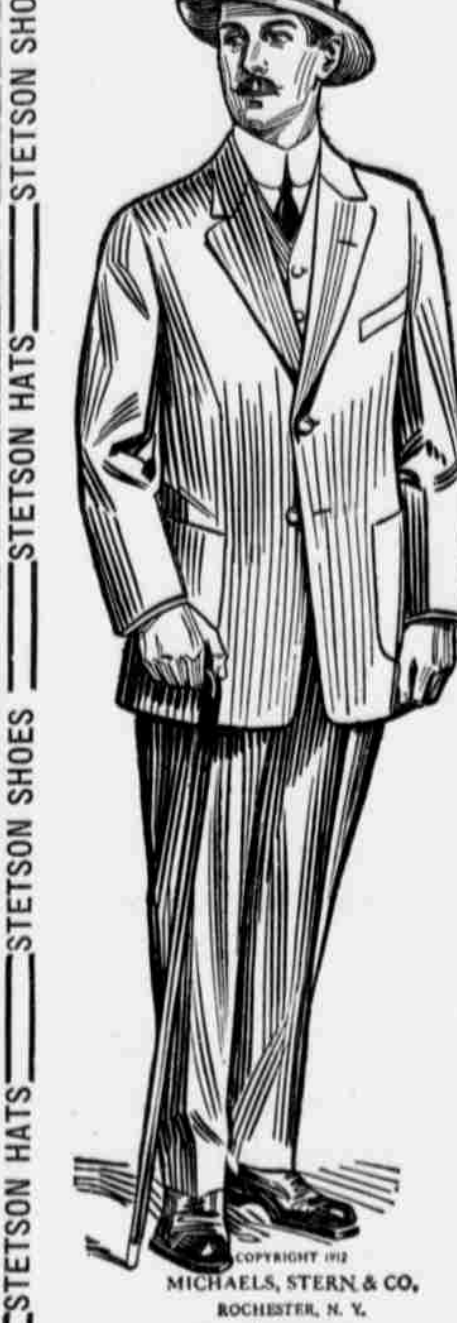
