TELLS WHAT IS DOING ON BAY FINE MACHINE SHOP OPENED

Henry Sengstacken Gives Out Booster Interview While In Portland.

The Portland Oregonian prints the following booster news of Coos Bay: A pulp mill, to cost \$750,000, is under construction just above Marshfield. The C. A. Smith Lumber & Manufacturing company is building the mill, according to Henry Sengstacken, who came to Portland last week to attend a convention of the Oregon Association of Titlemen.

"The lumber business is improving, and large improvements and developments are under way," said Mr. Sengstacken. "The Smith pulp mill is to be completed within six months. It will be situated immediately south of the large sawmill on Isthmus Inlet, just above Marshfield.

"This mill will consume the waste from the C. A. Smith Lumber Mills, and produce paper pulp, wood alcohol, turpentine and rosin in large quantities.

"The Coos Bay Fuel company recently was organized by the C. A. Smith interests with Patrick Hennessey, ex-superintendent of the Liberty mines, as manager. The company expects to be ready to ship coal within three months. This mine is close to tidewater on Isthmus Inlet, and is favorably located for cheap transportation. It will prove a paying mine.

"A large power plant is also under construction by the C. A. Smith company, which will not only furnish power for their sawmills and pulp-mill, but will furnish power for the Terminal railroad, and all the logging donkeys, so that the company can do its logging with electricity instead of steam as soon as the plant is complete. This will reduce the cost of logging, and remove the danger of fire in the woods, frequently caused by sparks from the steam donkeys.

"The Coos Bay Terminal company is busy building its road between Marshfield and North Bend, and is at present working on the Marshfield end with a large force of men.

"Simpson's large mill at Porter is running on full time, and the new steam schooner A. M. Simpson is making quick trips between San Francisco and North Bend, carrying large loads.

"The Kruse & Banks shipyard at North Bend is busy, having at present three new vessels on the stocks besides repair work. One of the new vessels under construction is being built for Estabrook & Co., of San Francisco, and is expected to run between San Francisco and Bandon, calling at Coos Bay on her down trip for passengers. She will be a fast sailer, and will be fitted up with first-class passenger accommodations.

"The steam schooner Nann Smith is running on schedule time, making a round trip from the C. A. Smith mill to Bay Point, near San Francisco, every five days. It carries about 1,800,000 feet of lumber to a load, which is taken on in 10 hours, loading with an electric crane. The schooner will carry about 90,000,000 feet this year, which will be more than three times as much as any other vessel of its size will carry during the same time.

"A sister ship of the Nann Smith is building in the east for the lumber company. It will be completed in about six months. It will be a little larger than the Nann Smith, and will have a few more improvements.

"McArthur, Perks & Co., who have the contract for the south end of the Eugene-Coos Bay railroad, are arranging to have railroad supplies brought to Coos Bay and Gardiner, and it is expected that active construction will commence on the Coos Bay end within the next two weeks.

"The present payroll of the C. A. Smith lumber interests is about \$80,000, and this will be increased to about \$100,000 by the addition of the pulp mill and coal mine."

HERMANN SEEKS VINDICATION

Pardon of Jones on Evidence That Jury Was "Stacked" Basis. WASHINGTON, D. C., June 22.—Blinger Hermann is here trying to get the House to authorize an investigation of Oregon land fraud prosecutions under Hitchcock, the Secretary of the Interior, with a view to securing vindication for himself, basing his demand on the revelations in the Jones pardon case.

As predicted, a thorough investigation of the methods of Prosecutor F. J. Heney and W. J. Burns, the detective, in the Oregon land fraud cases is being demanded of Congress. That an investigation would be called for was evident when President Taft granted an unconditional pardon to Willard N. Jones a few days ago, the pardon being based on the evidence showing the jury was "hand picked" by the Government and "stacked" so that the defendants could not secure a fair trial. In the trial of Hermann the jury disagreed, standing, it is said, ten for conviction and two for acquittal.

Bradshaw - Kimball Company Will Be Ready for Business Next Week.

One of the most up-to-date and complete machine shops and garages in Oregon will be opened early next week on North Front street, just North of Alder, by the Bradshaw-Kimball Co., Inc. Most of the machinery has been installed in the new building and the plant will be a model factory.

The firm will handle all kinds of machine work, from repairing to building absolutely new parts or machines. They have the largest lathe ever brought to this section which will enable them to handle work that has hitherto been sent to Portland, Seattle or San Francisco.

The equipment of the new shop will not only permit them to turn out all classes of work but it will enable them to do it promptly. The up-to-date machinery is labor saving; thereby reducing the cost of production.

The new building was especially designed for a machine shop and garage. It is 75x50 feet, and well lighted throughout. In the front, an office has been arranged and the balance is divided between the machine shop and the garage. There is room for twelve or more machines and there is also room for taking three or four machines to pieces for overhauling and repairing simultaneously.

Besides this class of work, arrangements are being made for the construction of ways where gasoline boats can be brought in and their machinery taken out for overhauling. This will be labor saving and time saving.

Besides the large lathe, a milling machine has been installed which enables the firm to turn out all kinds of gears. It is a marvel in this respect and will be of great benefit in repairing autos and gasoline engines.

Build Gasoline Engines

Besides the general repair work, the firm will manufacture a gasoline engine of their own, known as the "B & K Engine". It is declared by those who have seen it to be another marvel, being much simpler than the ordinary gasoline engine. Where many gasoline engines have a hundred or so parts and springs, the B & K Engine has only eight, insuring greater durability as well as simplicity and service.

Mr. Bradshaw who comes here from Portland is rated as one of the best gasoline engine experts on the coast in addition to his reputation as a mechanic. He is president of the firm.

Mr. H. J. Kimball, Jr., who will be secretary and treasurer of the firm, will have general charge of the office and business. He is well known here having spent considerable time here in the past looking after his large property interests.

Besides themselves, they will have M. L. Curry who has been engaged in auto repair work on the Bay for some time associated in the business. Mr. Curry is now in Portland looking after new machinery but will return in a few days to aid in rushing out a considerable amount of work that has already accumulated.

It is worth a trip to the shop to merely look over the fine up-to-date equipment they have installed.
