NORTH BEND IS TWICE VICTOR

Defeats Marshfield 7 to 2 and Eastside 7 to 6 Sunday Afternoon.

North Bend bunched hits off Marshfield yesterday and won 7 to 2. It was a well played game, full of life and ginger, with enough hitting to make things interesting. The grounds were in fair condition and excepting for a small shower in the second inning, the weather was ideal and there was a good attendance.

North Bend started out with a run in the first inning and in the second a home run, a two-bagger, a single and a base on balls off Sutton combined with an error by McCutcheon netted four more. In the sixth North Bend made another rally, getting three singles, one of which was a fluke. The ball was grounded to McCutcheon but it took a lucky bound and cleared his head by two feet. The inning added two more runs to the North Bend column, making a total of seven.

Marshfield got almost as many hits as North Bend, but Hull kept them well scattered and tightened up at the critical moments. Marshfield made its runs in the third and fourth innings. Several times during the game they had good chances to score but luck went against them. In the field they played a brilliant game and Captain McCutcheon's error was the only one tallied against his team. They also showed an improvement with the willow but were nevertheless outbatted by North Bend. During the game two double plays were pulled off, both by Marshfield. In the third Heath grounded to Sutton who caught Wallace on second. Briggs then doubled Heath on first. In the sixth another double play was pulled off. Burke catching Gaffney's fly and doubling Maloney on third.

For North Bend, Wallace was the star of the day, getting a home-run and two singles and accepting seven chances without an error. For Marshfield, G. Johnson got three hits, stole three bases and made a beautiful running catch of Hull's fly which looked like a clean hit. Briggs got two safe hits and accepted eight chances and Landers, Burke and Abbott got a bingle each. Burke's hit was a pretty two-bagger over second and brought considerable applause because it was a quick throw by Hull who thought to catch Burke napping and slip over the third strike.
