The Postal Savings Department of the Marshfield Postoffice shows a rapid growth and is making one of the best records of the smaller offices in the country according to the post-office department inspector.

Today marks the close of the first year of the department in the Marshfield Postoffice. F. L. Sumner, assistant postmaster, gave out the following figures today showing the volume of business handled by it:

CHANGE PLANS OF TRAP SHOOT

Principal Events in Tourney Here July 2 Will be Team Contests.

The change was made after a conference with representatives of the Coquille gun clubs. Victor Wickman of the Coquille Club was in Marshfield this week and said that many of the medium shots were averse to entering unless it was arranged for team prizes.

In consequence, it is expected that each club will select a team of twelve to compete for the prizes. The events will probably be as follows:

First—15 birds, \$1 entry fee, \$25 added money, 60 and 40 per cent.
Second—15 birds, \$1 entry fee, \$25 added money, 60 and 40 per cent.
Third—20 birds, \$1.50 entry fee, \$50 added money, 60 and 40 per cent.

There will also be some preliminary events. The Bandon and Coquille trap shots are practicing hard and it is expected that some unusually good scores will be made.
