CONCERT

There can hardly be a just criticism of the excellent concert given at the Masonic Temple last Saturday evening by Mrs. Wm. Horsfall, Jr., pianist, Mrs. A. B. Gidley, vocal soprano, Mr. W. A. Toye, clarinetist and Mr. Lew Keyzer, violinist. The performance was so far beyond the usual run of musical displays given hitherto, with the possible exception of the Chaminade Club concerts, as to beggar description. Three of the musicians are already well-known and famed and Mr. Lew Keyzer is rapidly winning his way to the hearts of all music-lovers by his mastery of his chosen instrument. The concert numbers were well chosen, and were received with ready appreciation by the audience. The rendition of the duo, "Semiramis," violin and clarinet, was a feat of skill, technique and thought interpretation, and to many made one of the most attractive numbers of the program. Perfect time and harmony marked its performance, with the undertone of accompaniment at which Mrs. Horsfall is supreme. Mrs. Gidley starred in her usual brilliant fashion, her selection of songs embracing all subjects from the highly dramatic "Cry of Rachel" to the light wisp of song "The Dainty Miss" that made one of her many encores. Mrs. Gidley's fourth number, "How Many a Lonely Caravan," with its low minor notes, gave unusual means of expression for the contralto voice of the gifted

soprano. Few accompanists can echo the work of Mrs. Horsfall. Touch, interpretation, power and every art that goes to make the finished musician, are hers in the highest degree, and her accompaniments, as well as the brilliant solo "Rondo Capriccioso" and the encore, Chaminade's "Les Sylphides," put the final touch of perfection to a concert that would have credited a far larger metropolis than Marshfield. The playing of Mr. Keyzer was a simple career of instrument; his notes were clear and perfectly inflected; his touch was mastery. The always beautiful "Humoresque" took on an added beauty under his hand, and other numbers were played with comprehension of necessary expression. Two encores, "Every Soul has a Song," and "Violins," were won from his violin. An absorbed audience and intense quiet in the house were only appropriate tribute to the perfection of musicians and program.
