

# ANNUAL CRUISE WAS EXCELLENT

Marshfield and Bandon Members of Naval Militia Return Home Today.

The Marshfield and Bandon members of the Naval Militia who have been on the annual cruise, returned yesterday on the Breakwater. The boys all seem to be well pleased with the trip and say they would not have missed it under any circumstances. They have been gone just two weeks in which time they were at San Francisco and Venice, some of the boys taking in Los Angeles as well.

The Maryland is the second ship in line of the Pacific Squadron and is fitted with all the latest devices introduced in the navy. She sailed from Portland to San Francisco where she made a 36 hours' stay and then went on to Venice, returning from there to Frisco and then to Astoria. In a speed trial she made 22 1/2 knots, and on the cruise she covered 1800 miles.

The boys received excellent treatment from the regulars and the officers on board. They spoke well of Capt. Edgar Simpson, who did everything in his power to make the trip a pleasant one for them. Ensign E. Gallier, of Bandon, was also well spoken of. They met the California Naval Militia in San Francisco and were tendered a good reception by them. The Washington boys made their cruise on the Pennsylvania.

All the drills were gone through on board ship. In the man-over-board drill the Militia boys got the buoy off in less time than it took the regulars, and in the fire drill on the boat their time was only a little slower than that made on the Maryland.

The boys said that they were well fed on board and had fruit, pastry, vegetables and the best of everything. There was no complaint made whatever and all were well pleased. Capt. Elliott made a speech on Captain's Day in which he praised the boys for their splendid behavior and hoped that they might sail under him should war ever break out and make it necessary.

## BIG SUIT FILED.

O. W. Hurd of Florence Sues for \$75,000 Salary.

EUGENE, Ore., June 28—O. W. Hurd, a business man of the lower Huslaw, has begun suit in the circuit court against three organizations in which he is interested, to recover salaries alleged to be due in excess of \$75,000.

From the Hurd Co-operative Salmon cannery he would recover \$6600 as salary since December 1, 1908, valuing his services as manager at \$100 a month the first seven months of the year and \$250 a month during the other five, for the salmon canning season. Interest and a loan brings this suit to \$7906.

From the Hurd Lumber and Navigation Co. he would recover \$22,050, manager's salary at \$300 a month and \$4163.50 interest. The third suit is against the Oregon & California Lumber Company, from which he asks \$500 a month as manager or a total of \$41,890, including interest.

Trouble between heavy stockholders of the three concerns is said to be the cause of the suits.

# UNITED STATES SCHOOL CENSUS

Persons of School Age in Country Number 27,750,599 Last Year.

WASHINGTON, D. C., June 28.—A preliminary statement giving the number of persons of school ages and the number and proportion attending school, as shown by the returns of the thirteenth census, has been issued by Director Durand of the bureau of census.

The census inquiry as to school attendance was merely as to whether the person had attended any kind of school at any time from September, 1909, to April 15, 1910. The statistics presented relate only to persons from 6 to 20 years of age; they do not include persons under 6 or over 20 years of age who may have attended school during the period named.

School Population 27,750,599. The total number of persons of school age—that is, from 6 to 20 years, inclusive—in continental United States in 1910, was 27,750,599, of whom 17,300,202, or 62.3 per cent, attended school.

Persons from 6 to 9 years of age numbered 7,725,234, of whom 5,678,320, or 73.5 per cent, attended school, while those from 10 to 14 years of age numbered 8,107,140, of whom 8,028,660, or 88.2 per cent, attended school.

Of the whole number of persons from 15 to 17 years of age, namely, 5,372,177, those attending school numbered 2,742,387, or 51.2 per cent, while of the 5,546,048 persons from 18 to 20 years of age there were 844,835, or 15.2 per cent, who attended school.

For the combined group 6 to 14 years, inclusive—the most common years of school attendance—there was a total of 16,832,374 persons reported in 1910, and of this number 13,706,980, or 81.4 per cent, attended school.

The period of maximum school attendance in the ages 10 to 14 years. For these years a comparison can be made with the census of 1900. In 1900, 79.8 per cent of the children attended school, as compared with 88.2 per cent in 1910. The following summary gives the percentage of children 10 to 14 years of age attending school in each of the years 1910 and 1900 by geographic divisions:

In the northern and western divisions nine-tenths of the children are enrolled in schools. In the three southern divisions the proportion approximates eight-tenths. A comparison of the two years shows an advance in all sections, but it is most marked in the southern states, reflecting the great progress of popular education in those states in recent years.
