NUMBER OF COWS MUST BE INCREASED.

IT HAS been discovered from the last census report that the number of dairy cows in the United States has doubled within the last 35 years; that is, they have increased from 11,000,000 to more than 22,000,000. It is computed that the increase in value has been even greater than the increase in number. It is estimated also by statisticians that the population will again double in the next 32 years and that if the people are to have the same amount of butter and milk, the number of dairy cows must be again doubled. But the increase goes on from year to year; for instance, in many counties in Oregon the increase of cows demanded is equal to 25 per cent annually. In Josephine county, these figures will hold good for many years to come and no one needs be surprised if the increase greatly exceeds the percentage named. Our farmers are finding out that the growing of forage pays best when it can be fed on the farm. We need canning factories now, so as to avoid shipping in canned milk. We must reach a point of being able to not only supply the home market, but to export both butter and cheese. This will be the most profitable business connected with farming.

The events were very interesting and drew a large number of entries. Some good records were made, the vault of Robert Graves, Jr., who made 5 feet, 10 1/2 inches in the class for boys under ten, being the best known. Geo. Deubner also made a fine showing in the pole vault. The fat man's race was one of the most comical ever seen here, and the bicycle and marathon races proved very interesting. The hundred yard dash, free-for-all was well contested, and taken in all the sport program was a most successful one. 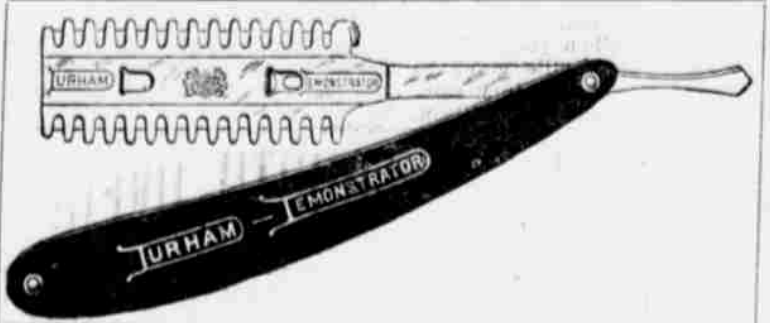
The steam schooner Casco crossed in from San Francisco yesterday and is loading at the R. R. docks.
