Engine Derailed—Owing to the engine being derailed between Myrtle Point and Coquille this morning, the train due here at noon did not reach Marshfield until about 3:15 this afternoon. No one was hurt and no serious damage was done.

Who Were They?—The Coquille Herald says: "Two Marshfield men visited our city Tuesday and were escorted by Marshall Evernden to the calaboose. Too much bum booze, causing bad blood and a battle upon the streets, was reason for the arrest."

Recovery Book—Anson Rogers yesterday found his missing memorandum book and checks, which he thought he had lost, at his home. He left them on his desk and they got covered up with other papers, causing him to believe that he had lost them.

Is Safe—Mrs. J. C. Swinford today received a card from her husband who is on a business trip to Maple Creek, Sask. The cards were mailed July 1, a day after the cyclone which did terrific damage at Regina, Sask. He does not mention the storm. Some fears were entertained at first that he was in the path of the cyclone.

Finds Glove—Ansgar Lagerstrom yesterday lost an auto glove and this morning telephoned a lost ad to The Times. Immediately after the ad reached The Times office, Fred McCormac brought the glove in, having picked it up on Broadway. He lost considerable stuff and F. E. Cohan sustained a slight loss on some goods he had

stored there. Water did some damage to the Marshfield Hardware company. A dishwasher at the Java Coffee House saw a man come out of the building about ten minutes before the fire was discovered and it is believed he started it either intentionally or accidentally.
