### CRUISE PLANS

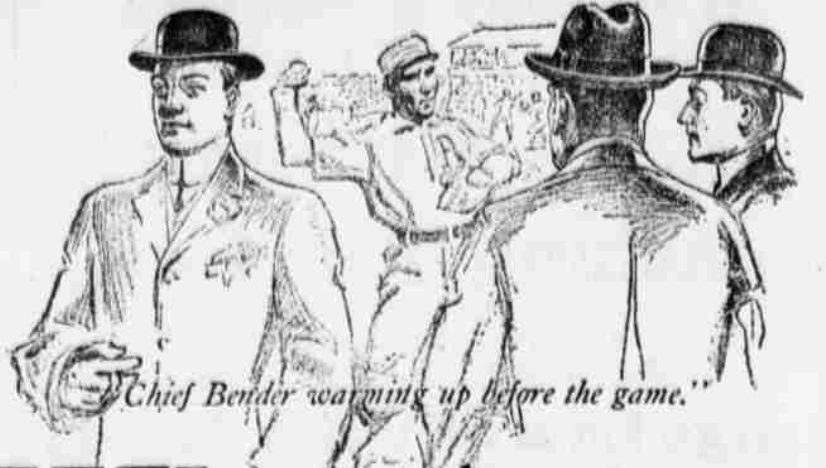
