The county seat boys had things their own way and there never was any doubt after the second inning, when they ran in three scores, what the outcome would be. Collier pitched great ball and allowed only four scattered hits up to the ninth when the local boys got busy and go three more, bringing the total up to seven. Coquille got 13 bingles off Sutton and managed to gather in 11 tallies. Johnson and A. Collier got three hits each for Coquille, and Jim and C. Collier each connected twice for safe ones. For Marshfield, Briggs was the star at the bat, getting three hits out of four times up. Woods, Burke, Landers and McCutcheon also connected safely.

Burke was back again at short but still showed the effects of an injured hand. G. Johnson was sick and Langworthy took his place at center. Del Hennessey was out in uniform yesterday and relieved Abbott in the seventh. Abbott had hard luck, getting a painful one on the end of the finger. Del led the league in batting last year and will prove a valuable man.

Burke pulled off a double play in the sixth, catching Oerding's fly and tagging Collier out at second. In the seventh another double was made. Briggs taking A. Collier's fly and doubling C. Collier on first.

The sixth inning was a bad one for Marshfield. Coquille scoring five times on three hits and two errors. The local boys didn't seem to know what to do with the ball when they got hold of it and made some poor plays. The fielding was slow and several hits should have been out.

Marshfield's three runs came in the seventh and ninth. In the seventh a base on balls, one hit and two errors sent two scores across the plate and in the ninth three hits brought in one more.
