ATLANTIC CITY, July 19-A sensational attack on President Taft, Theodore Roosevelt and the republican and democratic parties in general marked the beginning here today of the eleventh National Prohibition convention. Clinton N. Howard of Rochester, New York, the temporary chairman, made a speech that bristled with denunciation of the "boss ridden, liquor controlled old parties." He declared nothing in the way of real reform was to be gained from either of them or from a third party dominated by Roosevelt, "No other president since the foundation of this

"We have already two whisky parties and do not need another" continued the chairman speaking of Roosevelt and the third party. From the point of view of Prohibitionists Roosevelt has by record, public utterances and confessed personal habits proven that he is the least desirable of them all. "Posing as the 'thou shalt not steal' candidate because his partisans were not preferred over Taft's in the convention he brazenly boasts that he stole the Isthmus of Panama from Colombia and let Congress debate about it afterward. If the Chicago convention played the same trick they got the cue from him.
