Gets Pension—Ephraim V. Nye, an old veteran who is seriously ill in Mercy hospital, North Bend, has just been advised that he has been allowed an increase of pension to \$30 per month dating from June 19.

New Road Nearly Complete—The road from South Slough to Bastendorff's Beach is almost completed and is reported to be one of the best stretches in the county. It is wide enough to allow teams or automobiles to pass each other with the greatest ease and is a great improvement over the old road.

Coquille Woman Dies—News reached Marshfield today of the death last evening of Mrs. Wilson, of Coquille, wife of a well known stockman in that city. Mrs. Wilson was formerly a Miss Gilkie and many friends will regret her early death. She was still under 20 years of age. Death followed a lingering illness.

Milo Pierson is Receiver—Judge Coke has appointed Milo Pierson receiver of the Lakeside Creamery on Petition of Edward Kruse of San Francisco, who holds a mortgage of \$1,000 on the property. The plant is not in operation and Mr. Pierson will have charge of the property until some final disposition is made of it. The plant was one of a string of creameries formerly owned and operated by Greene, Foster & Lehmann of San Francisco.

Reedsport on the Map—Congressman Hawley has recommended the establishment of a postoffice at Reedsport, Douglas county, with Joseph Lyons as postmaster. Reedsport is a new townsite about three miles south of Gardiner. Several industries, including a cannery, a creamery and a cold storage plant have been located at this point and the promoters of the townsite claim that Reedsport will be the terminal of the railroad now being constructed by the Southern Pacific company, and, because of this and its deep water facilities, has a bright future. —Roseburg Review.
