MOODY CASE IS DECIDED

Justice Pennock Decided Controversy in His Court Against Defendant.

The case of P. M. Moody vs. C. H. McLaughlin was decided this morning in Justice Pennock's court in favor of the plaintiff. Moody had a claim against McLaughlin for \$8.49 for groceries. Moody gave McLaughlin the use of his house where he had the groceries stored. They were used up and when a bill was presented McLaughlin refused to pay. An ill feeling has prevailed for some time between the two and the evidence was very contradictory. Justice Pennock decided that McLaughlin was responsible for the goods and so gave a decision in favor of Moody.

Southern Oregon Co. Making Improvements in Empire Plant.

Preparations for the salmon canning season are being made by the Southern Oregon Co. at Empire. The cannery in that city will be operated as usual this year and some improvements are being made for the season's work. The warehouse is being enlarged and the machinery is being overhauled.

The salmon canning season begins July 15 and continues until the middle of November. There is nothing yet to indicate what kind of a salmon run there will be this year but the fishermen hope for a good season. It is reported that the cannery in Marshfield which was operated last year by Capt. Reynolds has been leased for the season by the Tallant Co. of Astoria.
