WORK STARTS AT SUTHERLIN

Engineers Establish Camp in
That Neighborhood and
Create Much Excitement.

Railroad activities in the neigh-
borhood of Sutherlin are attracting
much attention in that neighborhood.
A press telegram to the Journal from
Sutherlin says:
Considerable excitement was
caused here Tuesday when it became
known that a party of 14 engineers
had established a camp west of
town. Engineer Mitchell is in
charge of the surveyors but just what
railroad is behind the movement is
not definitely known.

Upon arrival Engineer Mitchell
had a long conference with W. E. St.
John, local manager of the Luse
Land & Development company, dur-
ing which a study of the plat of the
Sutherlin townsite was made. The
engineers are now running lines west-
ward from the townsite and setting
stakes, but are not following the
same lines made by a party of engi-
neers here last fall. Engineer Mit-
chell is reported to have made the state-
ment that the survey would extend
through Garden Valley, Coles Valley
and east through Sutherlin Valley to
the Cascade range.

In the upper end of the Sutherlin
Valley there are several thousand
acres of the finest timber in the
state. Recently it was reported that
some interests had taken over the
timber and that a large sawmill
would be built in Sutherlin in the
near future. That there is some
foundation for this rumor is apparent
from the fact that timber cruisers
were encountered in the east end of
the valley last week and they made
inquiry regarding the distance to the
sections where the timber is located.
They were strangers in this section
and were amply provided with camp-
ing outfit and provisions.

Only a week ago the city council of
Sutherlin was asked for a franchise
through Calapooia street on which to
conduct high power electric wires.
The wires will extend from the big
electric plant at Winchester, recent-
ly taken over by A. Welch, who is
thought to represent the Hill inter-
ests. Pole holes are now being dug
for this line.

MYRTLE POINT IS SELECTION

Fruit Growers Decide Experi-
ment Station Should Be
Inland That Far.

That the proposed experiment farm
for Coos County be located back from
Myrtle Point was the decision of Co-
quille Valley fruit growers at a re-
cent meeting. Regarding the gather-
ing the Myrtle Point Enterprise says:
Members of the Coquille Valley
Fruit Growers' Association met with
the Myrtle Point Horticultural So-
ciety at the latter's regular meeting.
There is a movement on foot to con-
solidate the two organizations and
this matter was pretty thoroughly
discussed. The general feeling in
both organizations is favorable to
consolidation, but no action was
taken.

The experiment farm matter also
came up and the following resolution
was drawn up and passed unani-
mously:
"Whereas, Most of the undevel-
oped land of this county, which is
promising for farming and fruit
growing, lies up the smaller streams
from Myrtle Point and back from the
ocean; therefore be it

"Resolved, That the proposed ex-
periment farm for Coos County
should be located back from the
ocean and up-stream from Myrtle
Point."

County Gives Money.
The County Court at its session
this week granted the petition of the
Coquille Commercial Club and de-
clared favorably for the appropri-
ation of the sum of \$3000 for the
basic fund for the establishment of
a demonstration farm for Coos Coun-
ty. The appropriation is made sub-
ject to the action of the State Legis-
lature and provided that body makes
an appropriation for the maintenance
of such institution in this county.

OPTION ON BOISE LINE EXPIRES

Control of Stock Passes From
Engineer Haines On Failure
to Complete Road.

The stock of the Coos Bay, Oregon
& Idaho Railway Company will im-
mediately pass into the hands of the
Chambers of Commerce of Marshfield
and North Bend as trustees for the
original stockholders. This is in ac-
cordance with the agreement made
October 4, 1909, when the railroad
stock was taken over and the Haines
survey was made.

The time during which the railroad
was to be built has expired and the
stock therefore goes back to the
Chamber of Commerce.
Made Agreement.
It will be remembered that the
Coos Bay, Oregon & Idaho Rail-
road was first started by local stockhold-
ers. On the date mentioned above
the company and Fred A. Haines en-
tered into an agreement. Haines had
been the chief engineer for the road.
Under the contract Haines was to
carry on the survey work and begin
the construction of the railroad,
commonly known as the Boise line
on or before July 1, 1910, and was
to continue construction at a point at
or near Roseburg, and have it com-
pleted before July 1, 1912.

It was understood in the agree-
ment that in the case Haines failed
to furnish the money to build the

road that it should not be considered
as "an act not within his control."
Option Expires.
The agreement specifies that
Haines must pay the original stock-
holders the amount of their certifi-
cates, together with interest at the
rate of 6 per cent, on or before July
1, 1912, or the option held by Mr.
Haines would terminate.

The road was not built and the
stock will go back to the Chambers
of Commerce of Marshfield and North
Bend. The stock is now held in es-
crow by Patrick Hennessey, as trustee
for the Marshfield Chamber of
Commerce, and J. C. Gray, as trustee
for the North Bend Chamber of
Commerce. This closes the Boise
road as far as Engineer Haines is
concerned.

Will Keep Up Company.

The stock company is in arrears as
to the fees due the state and re-
quired to be paid by all corporations
annually. The Chambers of Com-
merce of the two cities will take im-
mediate steps toward paying the fees
due so that the corporation will be
kept alive and the right of way and
surveys can be held.

The matter is to be brought up be-
fore the Chamber of Commerce im-
mediately by Col. Wm. Grimes, chair-
man of the executive committee in
order that such legal action as is
deemed necessary will be taken by
that body to secure proper title to
the survey.

THREE WOMEN TRY SUICIDE WILL ARREST LAW BREAKERS

Attempt to Take Their Own
Lives at Reno and Will
be Prosecuted.

RENO, Nev., July 12.—Three wo-
men beset with domestic difficulties
have within the last few days at-
tempted suicide either through
shooting or taking poison. In each
case the attempt was a failure, and
District Attorney William Woodburn,
Jr., is compelled to prosecute them
under the new Nevada statute mak-
ing an attempt at suicide punishable
by confinement in the state peniten-
tiary.

The law is mandatory and the Dis-
trict Attorney must enforce its pro-
visions. In two of the cases the women
are divorcees. Mrs. Thomas Sharkey,
who before her marriage was Mrs.
Fredericks, having been divorced
from Fredericks a number of years
ago, shot herself, the bullet, how-
ever, not striking a vital spot. Only
a few weeks ago Robert W. Preston
secured a divorce from his wife who
returned to Reno the other night and
swallowed carbolic acid. She is re-
covering.

This morning, Mrs. Ray West at-
tempted to end her life, but was un-
successful. She, too, had domestic
troubles and sought relief in death.
She will recover, and District At-
torney Woodburn is confronted with
the task of filing felony complaints
against the women in carrying out
the provisions of the Nevada statute
which became effective the first of
the year.

CYCLONE AT GRAND RAPIDS

Forty Persons Injured When Big
Storm Strikes East.

S. P. WORK SOUTH OF GARDINER IS INDEFINITELY POSTPONED

WILHELM CURBS AGGRESSIVES

Makes Speech Regarding the
Raising of German Flag
Over Part of Morocco.

(By Associated Press to the Coos Bay
Times.)

BERLIN, July 13.—Emperor Wil-
liam has just made a speech designed
to curb the too aggressive spirit of
those Germans who wanted to see the
German flag raised over a part of
Morocco last year. This speech,
which was made at a yacht regatta
banquet at Hamburg and was largely
addressed to Hamburg merchants,
contained a pointed reference to the
Agadir incident. The passage in
question was as follows: "As you
all know, gentlemen, the flag must
wave in honor, and it must not be
recklessly spread to the breezes or
hoisted where we are not sure that
we can defend it. You will under-
stand why I have practiced self-re-
straint in spreading the German flag
at places where many persons per-
haps long to see it floating. I was
governed by an old Hanseatic prin-
ciple: 'The little flag is easily bound
to the staff, but it costs much to haul
it down again with honor.'"

The Emperor went on to say that
he could claim that, during his reign,
the honor of the German flag has
never been insulted from any quar-
ter; then, addressing himself to the
Hamburg merchants present, he added:
"I pledge you, and I stand for it,
that my flag will follow you
wherever you lead the way." This
latter remark shows that the Em-
peror does not believe in the old po-
litical maxim that trade follows the
flag. He is less aggressive, and is
content to have the German flag fol-
low trade.

WANT RECIPROCITY.

Province of Saskatchewan Changes
Its Views at an Election

GRAY STILL IN LIME LIGHT

Another Chapter Is Enacted in
Strange Case—Money
Comes From Brother.

One thing after another seems to
happen in the Frank O. Gray case.
The following from the Roseburg Re-
view is the latest:

Another chapter in the case of
Frank O. Gray, held under \$225
bonds in the county jail here for
murdering Mrs. Carrie Settle, of Oak-
land, out of \$250, has developed
from the remittance to the County
Judge by Gray's brother at Pitts-
burg, Kansas, of \$400, now held in
a local bank. A message accompany-
ing the remittance said that the
money was to pay Gray's "fine." As
Gray has not been fined, County
Judge Wonacott, whom the sender
of the money probably thought was
the committing magistrate in the
case, declined to accept the money.
In doing this he prevented the coin
from falling into the hands of the
local law firm of Buchanan & Por-
ter, attorneys for Mrs. Settle, who in-
stituted garnishment proceedings
against the County Judge in an ef-
fort to recover the amount of money
which Gray secured from their client.
The bank refused to turn the money
over to Gray, because the instruc-
tions of the sender were that it be
delivered to the County Judge. In
the dilemma, Gray engaged Attorney
J. O. Watson, who is now in com-
munication with the Kansas rela-
tives for the purpose of securing per-
mission to apply \$225 of the money
on Gray's detention bond.

General Manager Tinkler Sends
Telegram Giving the
News.

DOES NOT AFFECT THE
PORTER BROTHERS WORK

Tunnel Near Gardiner and Rest
of the Line to Eugene
Will Be Built.

Thos. Dixon, acting Superintendent
on Coos Bay for the MacArthur Bros.
and Perks company, with headquar-
ters in North Bend, received a tele-
gram today from Chas. E. Tinkler,
general superintendent for the same
company saying that work on the
Southern Pacific from the Gardiner
tunnel to Coos Bay has been indefi-
nitely postponed. Mr. Tinkler has
been in Portland in conference with
Engineer Hoey of the Southern Pacific
and sent the telegram from that
city. He stated in the telegram
that he would leave Portland at once
for Arizona.

To Wait for Tunnel.

Mr. Dixon says that he surmises
the reason for postponing the work
between this place and Gardiner is
that it will require at least a year
longer to build the tunnel at Gardi-
ner than it will to build the road be-
tween North Bend and the tunnel
and that the company could begin a
year from now building the line from
Coos Bay to the tunnel and still have
it ready before the tunnel was com-
pleted.

Porter Bros. Will Work.

This announcement does not affect
the work of Porter Brothers or that
of Twohy Brothers. It is said that
the work of building out of Eugene
will be continued and that Porter
Brothers will go on with their work
and will construct the tunnel this
side of Gardiner. Mr. Dixon says
that the building of the part of the
road from Coos Bay to the tunnel
would not hasten the completion of
the road.

Mr. Dixon also says that the mat-
ter may be taken up with the New
York office of MacArthur Perks com-
pany and that if the contracts with
the Southern Pacific are in such
shape that it is possible the contract-
ing firm may force the building of
the road from this point. It may be
possible, suggests Mr. Dixon, that
Mr. Wilkey will be in a position to
force the construction work to be car-
ried on at once at this end of the line.
Mr. Dixon will remain in North
Bend in charge of affairs for a time
at least.

WORK DISCONTINUED.

PREDICTS TROUBLE

Senator Bailey Says We Will Face
a Revolution

(By Associated Press to the Coos Bay
Times.)

WASHINGTON, July 13.—Senator
Bailey of Texas in a farewell address
at a private dinner last night pre-
dicted that if conditions in the United
States could change as much in the
next thirty years as they have had in
the last thirty years the country
would face a condition paralleling
that of the French revolution. The
colleagues of the Texas senator re-
vealed this remark today. Bailey
charged that the members of con-
gress by their own cowardice were
responsible for a condition of unrest
which prevails. He particularly
blames the democrats for exaggerat-
ing the importance of existing evils.
"That this republic is near a crisis
is what that greater and wiser man
think," said Bailey. "I do not
forget that the French revolution
came while the governors were at the
banquet tables to come face to face
with violence and bloodshed in the
streets of Paris. I do not say the
United States is facing such state of
affairs, but I do maintain that if
within the next thirty years the coun-
try should continue to change as it
has in the last thirty years, we will
find ourselves face to face with such
a condition at the end of that time."
"You senators and representa-
tives," continued Bailey, "can pre-
vent this great crisis and you will do
so if you have the courage to go out
and tell the public the truth. Every
evil which exists in the country today
can be corrected without danger to
principles and policies upon which
this republic is founded and it should
be done."

"The impatience of the minority
of which I myself have been a mem-
ber is largely responsible for the
state of mind of the people of the
United States today for they have
grossly exaggerated the evils of the
country."
