**THE CIRCUIT COURT OF THE STATE OF OREGON, IN AND FOR THE COUNTY OF COOS.**

Edward Kruse, Plaintiff, vs. J. R. Green, W. W. Foster, and C. T. Green, W. W. Foster and C. T. Lehmann, partners, doing business under the firm name of Green, Foster and Lehmann, Defendants.

To J. R. Green, W. W. Foster and C. T. Lehmann, defendants above named:

In the name of the State of Oregon you are hereby notified that you are required to appear in the above entitled Court and answer the complaint filed against you in the above entitled suit within six weeks from the 13th day of July, 1912, the first day of the publication of this summons, and if you fail so to appear and answer said complaint on or before the 24th day of August, 1912, the last day of the time prescribed in the order for the publication of this summons, for want thereof the plaintiff will apply to the Court for relief demanded therein, a succinct statement of which is as follows, to-wit:

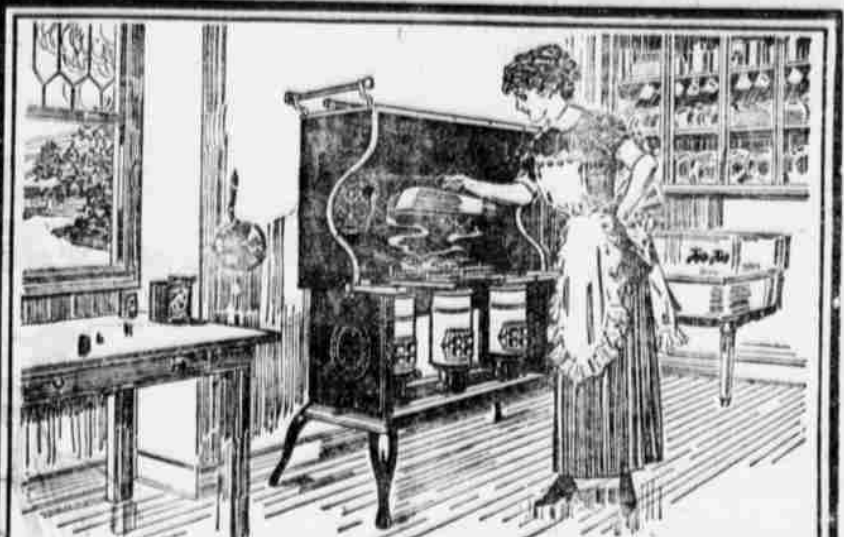
First, that plaintiff's mortgage on the hereinafter described property be declared to be a first and prior lien thereon; that plaintiff have judgment against said defendants for the sum of \$1000.00 with interest at 6 per cent from May 29th, 1912, and \$500.00 as attorney fees, in addition to his costs and disbursements; and the Court adjudge and decree that said mortgage be foreclosed on the property therein described, and to-wit:

One 15 hp. Scotch marine boiler complete; one 12 hp. horizontal centrifugal steam engine; one double under Worthington pump; one 600 lb. simplex churn; one 400 lb. Jumbo butter cutter and moulder; one 600 lb. mangle; one 100 lb. mangle; one 100 lb. Peerless ripener; two platform scales; one facie cream separator; two 8 hp. gasoline launches complete; one scow and one 16 ft. skiff; all tools, machinery, cans and appliances whatsoever in the possession of the Lakeside Creamery; one two-story frame building known as the Lakeside Creamery, and that the same be sold and the proceeds therefrom applied to the costs and expenses of the plaintiff herein, and for such other and further relief as to the Court shall seem most and equitable.

Service of this summons is made by publication in pursuance of an order made by the Hon. John S. Coke, Judge of the Circuit Court of the State of Oregon, for the County of Coos, dated the 10th day of July, 1912, directing the publication thereof in the Coos Bay Times, a newspaper published at Marshfield, Coos County, Oregon, for once a week, for the period of six consecutive weeks.

**Proposed New Laws for Oregon**

**Forty-Seven Measures Have Been Filed With the Secretary of State.**

SALEM, Or., July 13.—When the clock tolled off the last hour of the final day in which referendum and initiative petitions can be filed in this state, Deputy Secretary of State Kozzer recorded forty-seven measures which will be placed on the ballot at the next general election for the approval or rejection of the voters.

With this great number of proposed new laws, there is not only the original character of the initiative and referendum law displayed, but the fact is forcibly impressed upon every one who is acquainted with the present political affairs of the state that never before in the history of Oregon has there been such a forward movement on the part of the citizens to enact new laws. From the appearance of the matter submitted to the secretary of state, according to various officials here, every one is desirous of creating new and model law, and in the event a similar increase in law-making is experienced hereafter, the secretary will be unable to cope with the situation unless the legislature provides more funds for special and separate assistance for the department.

Proposed by Initiative petition: Equal suffrage amendment extending the right of suffrage to women. (Filed December 20, 1910).

Referred people by legislative assembly: For constitutional amendment of section 8, article V, for the purpose of creating the office of lieutenant-governor, etc. (Filed February 1, 1911).

For an amendment to section 1, article IX, of the Oregon constitution, providing for a uniform rate of taxation, except on property specifically taxed. (Filed February 17, 1911).

For an amendment of section 32, article I, Oregon constitution, for the purpose of permitting taxes to be levied upon different classes of property at different rates, etc. (Filed February 17, 1911).

For constitutional amendment to repeal all of section 1 of article IX, except that part prohibiting poll and head taxes in Oregon, etc. (Filed February 17, 1911).

For amendment of section 1 of article XVII of the constitution so as to require for the adoption of any proposed constitutional amendment a majority vote of all electors voting at such election, instead of a majority of those voting on the amendment only. (Filed February 21, 1911).

For constitutional amendment of section 3, article XI, of the constitution, making stockholders in banking corporations liable to pay for the benefit of depositors an amount equal to the par value of the stock held by any stockholder in addition to having originally paid the par value thereof. (Filed March 7, 1911).

**Referendum Ordered by Petition.**

An act appropriating \$175,000 for building and equipping an administration building and extending heating plant to the same; and also appropriating the sum of \$153,258.92 for the apparatus, making repairs, additional improvements, additions, paying salaries of instructors and employees, etc., for the University of Oregon. (Filed May 18, 1911).

An act appropriating \$175,000 for the construction, equipment and furnishing of a modern library and museum building, and extension of heating plant to the same, for use of the University of Oregon. (Filed May 8, 1911).

An act vesting the railroad commission with power and jurisdiction to supervise and regulate every public service corporation and utility in the state of Oregon, as to the adequacy of the service rendered and facilities provided, the fairness of rates, tolls and charges to be collected from the public therefor. (Filed May 18, 1911).

An act appropriating \$50,000 for building, furnishing and equipping a dormitory at the Oregon Normal School at Menmouth. (Filed May 13, 1911).

**Proposed by Initiative Petition.**

For a law to create the county of Cascade out of the eastern portion of Clackamas county, and provide for its organization. (Filed June 26, 1912).

For an act levying an annual tax of six-tenths of a mill on a dollar on all the taxable property of the state for university and agricultural college purposes, and to provide for the government of such institution. (Filed June 29, 1912).

For an amendment of section 1, of article IV of the constitution of Oregon, providing no measure submitted to the people at any election under the initiative shall take effect or become the law unless it shall be approved by a majority of all electors voting at such election, whether voting on such measure or not, etc. (Filed July 1, 1912).

For an act providing for the holding of road district meetings and county road meetings and defining their duties; providing the methods by which the voters of any county in this state may provide for the issuing of bonds, etc. (Filed July 1, 1912).

For an act creating a state highway department; providing for its officers; defining their duties; appropriating money therefor, etc. (Filed July 1, 1912).

For a law to amend section 20 of chapter 226 of the laws of Oregon for 1911, placing the state printer on a flat salary. (Filed July 2, 1912).

For an act defining hotels in the state of Oregon, and providing for the use of fire escapes, gongs, ropes, stand pipes and hose, and chemical fire extinguishers therewith and therein, and defining the same, etc. (Filed July 2, 1912).

For a law to protect sub-contractors, material, men and laborers performing labor for the state or any municipality or sub-division, requiring a sufficient bond to protect the state from liens, etc. (Filed July 2, 1912).

For an act prohibiting the employment of convicts of the state penitentiary by any private firm, person or corporation, and providing for their employment on public highways, and on or about the state institutions. (Filed July 2, 1912).

For an act prohibiting the employment of county, city or town convicts by any private persons, firm or corporation, and providing for their employment on public highways and other work of a public nature, etc. (Filed July 2, 1912).

For an act to provide for the construction of permanent roads, to create a state road board, and defining the duties and powers thereof; to create the office of state highway commissioner, etc. (Filed July 2, 1912).

For an amendment of section 7 of article XI of the constitution, providing that the credit of the state shall not be loaned, and placing a limitation upon its powers to contract debts. (Filed July 2, 1912).

For an act to authorize counties to issue bonds for road construction; defining the method of expending money raised by bond sales, etc. (Filed July 2, 1912).

For an amendment of section 10 of article XI of the constitution, limiting the powers of counties to contract debts. (Filed July 2, 1912).

county high school of Wallowa county, Oregon, maintained and operated at Enterprise, etc. (Filed July 2, 1912).

For an act to elect the members of the Port of Portland commission and to safeguard and provide for the deposit of such funds as may come into the hands of the Port of Portland commission, etc. (Filed July 2, 1912).

For a local law for the county of Multnomah to exempt from all taxes levied in Multnomah county the assessed values of all improvements on, in and under land, and of all personal property which the state laws require shall be assessed by the county assessor, etc. (Filed July 2, 1912).

For a local law for the county of Coos to exempt from all taxes levied within Coos county, the assessed value of all improvements on, in and under, land and personal property which the state laws require shall be assessed by the county assessor, etc. (Filed July 2, 1912).

To prohibit person or persons, associations or combinations of associations, or societies and others, from conspiring or combining together for the purpose of a boycott, and making it unlawful to boycott any industry, or manufacturer, or owner, or operator of any factory, store, workshop, or any other person, firm or corporation engaged in lawful business and making it unlawful for any person or persons, associations, or combinations of associations, or societies, or others, by itself, or any of its members, to go upon or near the premises of any manufacturer, factory owner, or any other person, firm or corporation engaged in lawful business, store or workshop and endeavor to enforce away or persuade workmen from working at said manufacturers' place of business, or any workshop, factory, store, or place of business of any person, firm or corporation engaged in lawful business.

Prohibiting the use of the public streets, parks and public playgrounds in incorporated towns or cities of the state of Oregon of a population of five thousand or over, by persons, organizations, assemblies or associations for speechmaking purposes, or for the purpose of holding public meetings for public discussion, and making it unlawful for any person or persons, organizations, assemblies or associations to congregate in any such place for speechmaking purposes, or for the purpose of holding public meetings for public discussion, unless written permit to do so be first had and obtained from the mayor of any such incorporated town or city, and providing a penalty for the violation of this act.

For an act to amend section 3551, Lord's Oregon laws, exempting certain property from taxation. (Filed July 2, 1912).

For an act to exempt all debts due or to become due, whether by account, contract, note, mortgage, bond or otherwise, etc. (Filed July 2, 1912).

For an act to tax gifts, legacies, inheritances and transfers by interstate laws, and to provide for the collection of the same, etc. (Filed July 2, 1912).

For an act to provide for a uniform percentage in the relationship of the classification ratings, providing for the establishment of minimum carload weights, etc. (Filed July 3, 1912).

For an amendment to section 16 of article XI of the constitution of Oregon, granting home rule to counties in the matter of building and maintaining roads and incurring indebtedness therefor, and granting counties to borrow money, etc. (Filed July 3, 1912).

For an amendment of article IV of the constitution of the state of Oregon. (Filed July 3, 1912).

For an amendment to section 2 of article IX of the constitution of the state of Oregon. (Filed July 3, 1912).

For an act to abolish capital punishment as a penalty for conviction of murder in the first degree; to substitute therefor life imprisonment at hard labor, etc. (Filed July 3, 1912).

For an act to prohibit person or persons, associations or combinations of associations, or societies and others from conspiring or combining together for the purpose of a boycott, and making it unlawful to boycott any industry, or manufacturer, or owner, or operator of any factory, store, workshop, or any other person, firm or corporation, etc. (Filed July 4, 1912).

For an act prohibiting the use of the public streets, parks and public grounds in incorporated towns or cities of the state of a population of 5000 or over, by persons, organizations, assemblies, or associations, for speechmaking purposes, etc. (Filed July 4, 1912).

For a local law for the county of Clackamas, to exempt from taxation all trades, labor, professions, business, occupations, personal property and improvements on, in and under land, etc. (Filed May 31, 1912).

For an act to prevent the county court of Harney county from building a new court house, etc. (Filed June 22, 1912).

For an act to provide funds to build roads and bridges in Jackson county under what is known as the "Scott Plan" to save Jackson county, Oregon, \$90,000 a year in interest, and to provide for the redemption of all outstanding Jackson county warrants in excess of the legal limitation. (Filed June 27, 1912).

For a local law for Wallowa county, to abolish and discontinue the
