BELIN, July 15—Woman suffraists, the Socialists and other advocates of the equal-pay-for-equal-work doctrine are much wrought up over a plan of the imperial post department, just announced, whereby 8,608 male employes are to be replaced by women on the score of economy. It is estimated that a yearly saving of about 6,000,000 marks or practically \$1,500,000 will be effected. The salary of some 3,600 of the posts to be filled with women will be 750 mark a year. This makes \$14.88 a month.
