MAY HAVE ONE MORE BATTLESHIP

Doubtful Just What Will Be Done About Naval Appropriation Bill.

WASHINGTON, D. C., July 19.—Senator Tillmann's refusal to abandon a \$300,000 improvement at the Charleston Navy Yard and the demand of the House that all battle-ships be cut out of this year's building program will probably result in a disagreement over the naval appropriation bill.

An effort is under way to secure a compromise in the House whereby one battleship will be agreed to.

POLICE SYSTEM IS SUSPECTED

Investigation of Rosenthal Murder is Still Being Closely Investigated.

NEW YORK, July 19.—The murder plot that brought Herman Rosenthal, the gambler's death, is being brought closer to the "Police System." William Shapiro, part owner of the "Murder Car," is giving the public prosecutor information that strengthens the belief that the slaying of Rosenthal did not spring from enmity of gamblers.

District Attorney Whitman again scored the police for the failure to get any further than they have in rounding up the murderers.

300 MEXICAN REBELS SLAUGHTERED

Caught in Trap by One Thousand Indians at Entrance to State of Sonora.

JUAREZ, Mexico, July 19.—Passengers arriving over the Mexican Northwestern from Madera today brought stories of a bloody massacre of the rebels at Dolores mountain pass, southwest of Madera, and at the entrance of the State of Sonora.

They said the vanguard of the column commanded by General Rojas by nearly one thousand Yaqui Indians and that of five hundred rebels less than two hundred returned to Madera in safety.

Full confirmation of the report is not yet obtainable.

FREIGHT RATES RUIN INDUSTRY
