CARRIED EVERYTHING -LEFT DEVASTATION

Searching Paries Are Engaged In Recovering Bodies of the Victims.

((By Associated Press to The Coos Bay Times.)

RENO, Nev., July 19 .- Searching parties from Lovelock and surrounding towns are scouring the floodswept canyon and hillsides in the vi-cinity of Mazuma and Seven Troughs, Humboldt county, Nevada, for the remains of the victims of the catastrophe which wiped out the twe mining camps late yesterday after-noon. Late reports say more than a score of bodies are recovered and it is believed the death list will number 30 or more. Mazuma is situated in a narrow canyon about half a mile below Seven Troughs. At Seven Troughs no loss of life is reported but practically all the business houses and residences and mills were wiped out. At Mazuma a solfd wall of water 15 feet in height sweps down the canyon without warning and with great force. It carried everything before it and left desolation behind it.
