**New Keeper Arrives**—The family of J. Dunson, the new keeper of the Arago lighthouse who succeeds William Denning, promoted to Astoria, arrived in the city today on the Breakwater.

**Here on Business**—E. C. Hutter, of the Slonds Saw company, is here from San Francisco calling upon the lumbermen. He is accompanied by H. C. Trickey, inspector for the company, who is making an inspection of the coast territory.

**Not to be Married**—Charles O. King, of the auto firm of Gorst & King, says he is not going away to be married. He states that he has no intention of bringing back a wife but is going away on business and will bring back a large auto for the Marshfield-North Bend run.
