Coyne is a new man who has just been signed up by manager Schott but he showed up well in his warm up so Capt. McCutcheon put him on the mound with one in and none down. Two errors and a hit made it four to nothing in the first inning but after that everybody played ball and things were lovely. Coyne only allowed two hits after the first and he fanned out seven of the Myrtle Point sluggers.

Jarvis started in to twirl for the valley boys and he had things pretty much his way up to the fifth but in that frame Marshfield hammered him all over the lot and he retired in favor of Poland with the score tied. But the local boys just kept on slugging the ball as if all pitchers looked alike to them and when the inning was over they had eight tallies to their credit. In the sixth they batted in three and two more in the eighth brought up the total to thirteen.

A large number of Marshfield's runs were due to inside base ball. The home team laid down a lot of easy ones and the Myrtle Point boys fell all over themselves trying to scoop them up.

The team has been reorganized in the past week and yesterday's game showed the result. There was good team work and little if any individual playing. The crowd was very small but if the boys keep up the good work they will get the support of the fans in the future.

## NORTH BEND IS PENNANT WINNER

### Coquille Defeated Six to Three Sunday—Big Crowd Sees Game.

North Bend won from Coquille again yesterday by a score of 6 to 3 and clinched the pennant for the first half of the season. The North Bend boys took the lead in the third, getting enough runs in that inning to win the game. The crowd was the largest of the season, over 600 being out. The excitement was at a high pitch and the players had a hard time to restrain themselves. There was complaining and arguing on both sides but not so much as in the game of a week ago.

The Coquille boys made more errors than their opponents and their bingles were more costly, also. Hull kept the hits well scattered while North Bend bunched them off Collier. Kissam played a great game at first and made two hits, one a home run and the other a single. Surbeck also connected safely for two bingles and Denny Hull got one.

Lorenz got a three-bagger and a single for his team and Byles batted out a single and a two-bagger. Coquille pulled off some poor plays on the bases and lost chances to score.

North Bend deserved to win and clearly outplayed the Valley team. There was not as much betting as had been anticipated. All wagers were even money and there was more Coquille cash in sight than the North Bend backers were able to cover.

The game was umpired by Felter, of Bandon, and as might have been expected in so important a contest, there was a kick on almost every close decision.

TIP FROM ROSEBURG  
 People There Want Haines Railroad Project Renewed.  
 The Roseburg Review says:  
 "About three years ago a party of Eugene people formed a company and began making surveys and securing rights of way for a railroad to the coast. In consequence big railroad builders became interested and a through line is now under construction. A Roseburg citizen suggests that now would be a splendid time to start such a movement here. The Haines survey, which is said to be an excellent one, and complete from Coos Bay to Roseburg, has reverted to the Chambers of Commerce of Marshfield and North Bend, and would make a splendid basis for operation by a local company. It ought not to be a really difficult matter to raise a sufficient fund locally to begin actual construction work on such a line. This would at least assure Roseburg being made the railroad center of Southern Oregon, whereas if we wait for the completion of the S. P. Co.'s line from Myrtle Point, their connection with the main line is likely to be made near Dillard.

FIRST BRIDGE BEGUN  
 Southern Pacific Contractors Begin Near Eugene  
 EUGENE, Ore., July 22.—Work on the first bridge out of Eugene on the Coos Bay branch of the Southern Pacific was begun Friday by the Bates & Rogers Construction company, which has the contract to do the concrete work on all the bridges between Eugene and Coos Bay. A camp has been established at Coyote creek and the forms for the concrete are now being built. During the past three weeks the company has built all the concrete culverts necessary between Eugene and the Coyote.

## LOGGING ROAD TIES UNLOADED

### Material for the Smith-Powers Extension Being Gathered at Myrtle Point.

The Myrtle Point Enterprise says:  
 The first of the material for the construction of the Coos Bay, Bandon & Eastern east and south of this city as a logging road for the Smith-Powers Logging Co., arrived yesterday in the shape of three loads of cedar ties. The ties are being loaded at Cedar Point, below Coquille, and we understand 15,000 ready for delivery, sufficient for between four and five miles of road. It is stated that the projected extension will require about 75,000 ties. Rails and other material are expected to arrive shortly. Just when actual operations will begin has not been learned and is probably definitely known by the company themselves. However, it is thought that a large portion of the extension will be completed inside the year and a half, as the Smith-Timber company have timber above this on which their contract expires in months to two years.

WORK NEAR ONTARIO  
 East and West Line Being Rushed Now  
 ONTARIO, July 22.—Material supplies are being rushed to the hour canyon and steel rails and ties are being sent in daily. The grading on the new road is completed to per basin, 40 miles west of here, and grading camps are scattered all through the canyon to Riverside, 100 miles west of Ontario. The new road will connect with the Harriman at Tem here.

Twenty-eight cars of material were sent on to Vale, 16 cars of rails and ties going up on a special train.

## AUTO LINE TO TEN MILE NOW

### Tom Sawyer, Jr., Establishes New Service—Plat New Ten Mile Tract.

An auto line to Ten Mile was started today by Tom Sawyer, Jr., who recently came to Coos Bay from San Francisco. The line will be operated through the remainder of the summer and as late this fall as the weather will permit.

Mr. Sawyer was operating an auto line at San Francisco where he had three seven-passenger, sixty-horsepower Stearn autos in the service. He has one car at Ten Mile now and will put on others if the business justifies it. The auto will connect with all boats and will make special trips for special parties.

The road from North Inlet has been improved so that it is possible to make the run between there and Lakeside in about thirty minutes. It requires about two hours for the stage to make the run.

Messrs. Simpson and Byler arranged for establishing the auto service. It is likely that a fast, light service will be put on the run between Marshfield and the North Inlet landing so that parties can come on at any hour of the day, regardless of the tide. This service will be a great boon to fisherman and other parties who wish to make short trips at the lakes.

Platt Large Tracts.  
 E. L. Robinson went to Ten Mile today to make surveys for platting an additional tract of the Simpson and Byler holdings along the lakes. It is planned to lay out a number of three, four and five-acre tracts for summer homes to be put on the market soon.
