**IS FOUND STARVING**

**John Hensley Discovered in Pitiful Condition at Coquille.**

The Coquille Sentinel says:  
John Hensley, a man of over 34 years of age, was found in the grove below A. J. Sherwood's residence Thursday morning, quite seriously ill and in almost a starving condition. Some boys playing in the woods discovered him and brought the news to town.

Dr. Richmond, Wm. Howell, Chas. Baxter and J. S. Barton went to examine into the matter and found the unfortunate lying in his blankets with two bottles of water by his side and so weak that he had to be lifted to his feet.

When asked what his name was he said he could not remember. Neither could he remember where he was from. He said, however, that he had been in the grove without food since July 3, and that the only thing he had had to sustain him during that time was water. He further stated that when he first came to Coquille about three or four weeks ago he had stopped for a couple of nights at a white hotel at the upper end of the main street.

Investigation showed that this hotel was the Vendome, and in a room of the Vendome was found his suit case and other personal belongings. The suit case contained an excellent pair of clothes, a white vest, several pairs of shoes, shaving paraphernalia and other things which plainly showed that he did not belong to the hobo class. He also had a bank book which showed a deposit of approximately \$250 in the Kallspeil Valley Bank of Usk, Wash.
