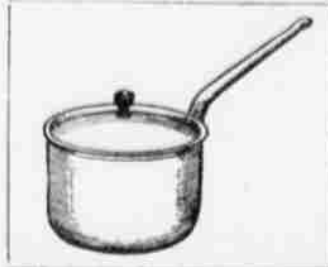

Auto to San Francisco.—Dr. Harry Simpson and Capt. Edgar Simpson of North Bend will leave in their auto tomorrow to motor to San Francisco. They will go to Roseburg via the Myrtle Point route and follow the railroad south from there.

Give Farewell.—Mrs. Henry Sengstacken has issued invitations for a farewell party to be given at her home Wednesday, July 31, for Mrs. M. C. Horton. The Horton family will leave next month for Poplar Bluff, Mo., where they will make their home.

Buy Autos.—L. W. Traver has received a new five-passenger touring machine. The auto is known as the Krit car and is made in Portland. It is a very classy appearing machine.
