To J. R. Green, W. W. Foster and C. F. Lehmann, defendants above named:
In the name of the State of Oregon you are hereby notified that you are required to appear in the above entitled Court and answer the complaint filed against you in the above entitled suit within six weeks from the 15th day of July, 1912, the first day of the publication of this summons, and if you fail so to appear and answer said complaint on or before the 24th day of August, 1912, the last day of the time prescribed in the order for the publication of this summons, for want thereof the plaintiff will apply to the Court for the relief demanded therein, a succinct statement of which is as follows, to-wit:

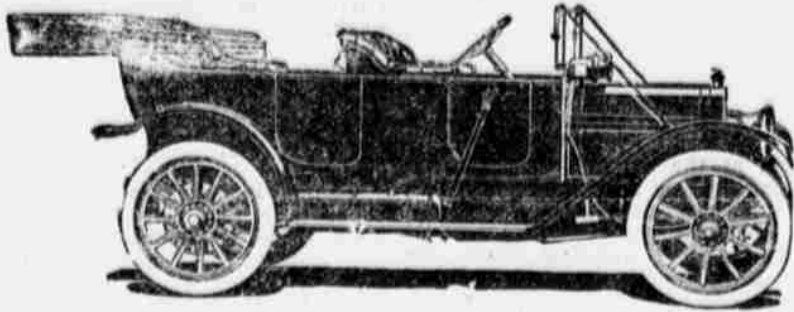
First, that plaintiff's mortgage on the hereinafter described property be declared to be a first and prior lien thereon; that plaintiff have judgment against said defendants for the sum of \$1000.00 with interest at 6 per cent from May 20th, 1912, and \$100.00 as attorney fees, in addition to his costs and disbursements; and that the Court adjudge and decree that said mortgage be foreclosed on the property therein described, and to-wit:
