### LABORERS ARE VERY SCARCE

#### Ten Thousand Men Needed to Supply Demand and Can't Get Them.

One of the best evidence of returning and reviving prosperity in all parts of the country is the increased industrial activity. Ordinarily presidential year puts a check on expansion of enterprise and weakens confidence.

The present year seems an exception. From all sections comes the news of renewed activity in all lines and nowhere is it greater than in the Pacific Northwest.

W. T. Stoll is just in receipt of a paper from his old home in Spokane which tells of remarkable scarcity of labor in all that section. Railway construction work is likely to be tied up unless some relief is obtained. Among other things the Spokesman-Review article contains the following:

"Threatening to tie up development and construction work on railroads, bridges, buildings and the lumber industry, a marked scarcity of labor, never before equaled in the history of the Inland Empire, exists. At least 10,000 men are needed in the northwest to supply the demand, according to employment officers. From as far east as St. Paul the demand for men in the market has been made. The supply is not sufficiently large to satisfy needs in the immediate vicinity of this city.

Southern Europeans are unavailable. The Italians, Austrians, Greeks and others of that class can not be had. Free transportation and no fee for employment are offered, but without avail.

"We could use 10,000 men right now if we had them," said Charles Lewis of the Adams & Lewis agency.

Mr. Lewis produced books of the company, letters, telegrams, and notations for telephone calls to substantiate his statement.

"There are many orders that we do not even jot down," he said. "It would be useless."

Scarcity Extends Far East. That the scarcity extends at least as far east as Chicago is shown by correspondence at the Adams & Lewis office. Contractors literally beg for men in their letters and telegrams. All kinds of inducements come from lumber camps and railroads. Extra and section gangs are unobtainable. Wages are constantly increasing. From \$1.75 to \$2 early in the spring, the crest of the rise has touched \$3 per day for common labor. Yesterday morning Great Northern railroad contractors were offering that wage, with transportation advanced and cheap board.

Mr. Lewis explains the situation, attributing the scarcity to the Canadian development work and the return to the old countries of so many foreigners. The harvest fields are claiming the greater number of the floating population, he says.

Foreigners Return Home "In 1906 and 1907, a somewhat similar condition prevailed," said Mr. Lewis. "That was during the time of the North Pacific construction. The great demand for men caused a heavy influx of southern European
