**Aid for Coquille.**—In his annual report, Major Jay Morrow, in charge of the United States engineering work for this district, recommends a special appropriation of \$6000 for further improving the channel of the Coquille river.

**In Old Home.**—In a letter to The Times Robert Marsden, Sr., says he is enjoying himself hugely during his visit at his old home in Wigan, England. When he wrote he was leaving Wigan for Southport and Blackpool to visit old friends and relatives.

**Repairing Wharf.**—The Southern Oregon Co. are reinforcing the piling under the cannery at Empire preparatory for the opening of the season. Mr. Wickman says the method of killing teredos recently advanced is impracticable as their chief destruction is done under water.

**Get Gratuity.**—Lee Webster this morning received a letter from Elliott C. Pierce, sergeant major of the Thirtieth Massachusetts Regiment in the Civil war, announcing that the state had decided to give every enlisted man in its troops in the Rebellion who had not received a bounty a gratuity of \$125. Major Tower of Empire and Mr. Webster are among those on the Bay who will receive Massachusetts' fine remembrance.

**Doubts Report.**—Rev. Father Munro of the Marshfield Catholic church, has not yet been formally notified of the action of Pope Pius in annulling the requirement of pledge in the marriage of Catholics and non-Catholics that the children of such unions be brought up in the Catholic faith. He doubts the authenticity of the newspaper reports of such action, saying that some minor change governing such marriages has been misconstrued.

**Name New Ship.**—As yet, the name of the new ship of the C. A. Smith company, which will be considerably larger than the Nann Smith, has not been named. It has been suggested that she be named the "Adelaide Smith," or "Myrtle Smith" after one of Mr. Smith's daughters and some have urged that it be called the C. A. Smith. Piling is now being driven for the slip for the new vessel, the slip being just below the Nann Smith's slip.

**Big Cable Breaks.**—The big lowering cable of the McDonnell and Vaughan camp on Daniels Creek broke the other day, forcing a suspension of operations there temporarily. The cable is of wire, an inch and a quarter in diameter and is a mile and a quarter long. The members of the force took advantage of the shutdown for a little holiday, most of them coming to town for a short stay. Last night the "Blue Ridge Tigers," which sprung into notice during the Fourth of July celebration, were again in evidence, the red hats and other garb being again brought into use.
