LEAVE TODAY ON AUTO TRIP

O. B. Hinsdale and Family Start on Return to Los Angeles via Gardiner.

O. B. Hinsdale and wife and two sons left today in their auto for Gardiner where they will make a short visit prior to their motor trip back to Los Angeles. They came up the coast route and will return along the central route.

Mr. Hinsdale's speedometer registered nearly 1200 miles for the run from Los Angeles to Coos Bay. He used just 100 gallons of gasoline on the trip. At Los Angeles he bought gasoline the cheapest—17 cents per gallon, and at Gold Beach, he paid the highest price—30 cents per gallon. He made the trip without any serious breaks to his machine.

Mr. Hinsdale is much interested in the plan for the improvement of the Marshfield waterfront and says that it would be one of the most beneficial moves that the city could make.

Mr. Hinsdale is also under the impression that the railroad will build in here on the east shore line of the Bay instead of crossing on a bridge.

Mr. Hinsdale says that the cost of living in Los Angeles is fully 20 per cent less than in San Francisco or on Coos Bay. However, wages are proportionately low there.

Mr. Hinsdale is now with a big investment company. Recently his company paid \$1,000,000 for a tract of 3000 acres between Los Angeles and San Pedro. They are now spending another million dollars in grading and improving streets, putting in gas, light and water and will build an industrial city there. Not a single lot will be sold until the property is all improved.

W. S. McFarland, who was formerly cashier of the First National Bank in Marshfield, is now secretary of the Southern States Gas company, with headquarters at Whittier, just out of Los Angeles. The company supplies 15 small cities.

WASHINGTON, D. C., July 31.—The Senate today by a vote of 42 to 17 passed over President Taft's veto a bill to reimburse those who furnished labor supplies to Contractor Corbett of the tunnel in Shoshone, Wyo., irrigation project to the extent of \$42,000.
