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TAFT FORMALLY NOTIFIED OF HIS NOMINATION FOR PRESIDENT

Senator Root Declares That Honor Comes to Him As Cleanest of All.

SAYS IT IS PARTY AGAINST PERSONAL AIM

President Accepts With Appeal for Republican Success and Prosperity.

WASHINGTON, D. C., Aug. 1.—President Taft was formally notified of his nomination by the National Republican Convention at Chicago.

"Your title to the nomination is as clear and unimpeachable as the title of any candidate since political conventions began."

"You are for progress along all lines of national development and the good we already have and holds fast to those essential elements of American institutions which have made our country prosperous and great and free."

President Taft accepted the nomination in a formal speech and although he defined in detail the issues of the campaign as he saw them, he reserved the right to amplify his statement in a letter as the campaign develops.

Speaking directly to the business men, Mr. Taft said: "To them I appeal, as all republicans, to join us in an earnest effort to avert the political and economic revolution and business paralysis which republican defeat will bring about."

DEFENSE OF TAFT

Declare Roosevelt Contests Were Not Instituted in Good Faith

WASHINGTON, August 1.—A statement approved by President Taft, defending his nomination by the Chicago convention was made public at the White House.

The statement, which is a document of 144 printed pages is a detailed denial of the charge that the nomination of President Taft was accomplished by the seating of fraudulent delegates to the convention.

"The total number of delegates mentioned to the convention," says the resume "was 1978, with 540 necessary to a choice."

"UNCLE SAM" IS BROKE AGAIN

There had been no previous trouble between the men.

HAGGARD WINS MOUNTAIN RACE

Washington Man Breaks Record In Trip Up and Down Mount Baker.

BELLINGHAM, Wash., Aug. 1.—Harvey Haggard of Glacier, Wash., won the annual Mount Baker Marathon this morning, covering 26 miles of mountain trail in seven hours and thirty-four minutes, lowering the record of last year two hours and thirty-eight minutes. Joe Frankaviz was second and Victor Galbraith third. Paul Westerlund of California finished among the tail-enders after reaching the summit first.

PROHIS NAME CANDIDATES

Only Seven in Attendance at Coos County Dry Convention Yesterday.

The Coos County Prohibition convention was held at the Marshfield Baptist church yesterday afternoon. The attendance was small, only seven responding to the call.

E. H. Joehnk was elected chairman and C. S. Hoffman secretary. Talks on the prohibition cause and the necessity of electing certain officers to enforce prohibition were made by several. Rev. Geo. L. Carr being the principal speaker.

It was decided that owing to the small attendance, no effort should be made to nominate a full ticket this time, but that the party should center its energies to secure the election of two members of the state legislature and a sheriff this time.

After some discussion of available material, the following nominations were made: For State Representative—Rev. G. Le Roy Hall.

For Joint Representative—F. E. Allen. For Sheriff—C. C. Carter, of Myrtle Point.

It is not known whether F. E. Allen will accept the nomination for joint representative from Coos and Curry counties but a committee will call on him soon.

Councilman F. E. Allen, when notified this afternoon, stated that he could not accept the nomination on the prohibition ticket.

It is announced that B. Lee Pagot, the prohibition candidate for United States Senator from Oregon, and O. A. Stillman, candidate for Congress from this district, will visit Coos county on their campaign tour in a month or six weeks.

FINDS GHASTLY DERELICT

It probably will be submitted to the committee next Tuesday. Hanford's resignation is being held at the White House for the committee's action.

CRABS SLAUGHTERED AT SEA BY WHOLESALER

SAN FRANCISCO, Aug. 1.—Thousands of dead sea crabs were reported to have been found floating on the sea off Point Reyes by the coasting steamer Asuncion, in a radiogram received here. The Asuncion ran for two miles through the strange manifestation. Captain Pfiel reported that he had stopped his vessel and examined hundreds of the crustacea, finding in nearly every instance that the legs had been violently torn from the bodies, while the shells were intact. No cause for the phenomenon has been advanced.

(By Associated Press) NEW YORK, Aug. 1.—The report that "Dago" Frank had confessed proved an error. He was identified by three witnesses as having participated in the murder.

NEW YORK, Aug. 1.—Steps toward the corroboration of confessions implicating Police Lieutenant Becker in the murder of Gambler Herman Rosenthal are to be taken carefully and slowly so that as District Attorney Whitman says the "whole truth of the relations between gamblers and police will come out." Satisfactory progress is being made by Whitman in supplying the missing links in the confession of "Bald Jack" Rose, "Bridgie" Webber and Harry Vallon, who in their stories to the public prosecutor, said "Becker instigated them in killing Rosenthal." Whitman has obtained important testimony confirming parts of the Rose and Webber stories that they met Becker by appointment after the murder.

Becker Worth Million "Dago" Frank and Shapiro, the chauffeur and joint owner of the murder car, were taken before the grand jury today. He inference was that "Dago" Frank had confessed and that his statement was sufficient to warrant their being taken immediately before the grand jury. Whitman said "Dago" Frank had been positively identified as one of the men who shot Rosenthal.

Whitman is investigating the stories that Becker is worth nearly a million dollars.

RAILWAY NEWS OF COOS BAY

John T. Long, Wealthy Los Angeles Contractor, In North Bend—Other Gossip.

John T. Long, a wealthy contractor of Los Angeles, has been in North Bend the past week and his presence there has excited considerable gossip. He built a railroad out of Salt Lake, built the Tacoma courthouse and city hall and recently completed a big sewer system at San Diego. He displays considerable familiarity with the plans for the Southern Pacific bridge across the Bay and some think he may be figuring on it.

Intimations that W. J. Wilsey who was connected with the MacArthur Perks people in starting the Pacific Great Western and Pacific Coast line projects and who bought considerable property in North Bend a few months ago, may be interested in a new railroad project from Roseburg to Coos Bay, according to reports afloat here. Wilsey is expected back on Coos Bay the latter part of this month and something definite about his reputed new project will probably develop then. H. C. Diers who was in Marshfield today on business states that he understands the Southern Pacific has closed negotiations for all the right of way in North Bend except a piece owned by Carl Albrecht of Marshfield.

ARCHBOLD CASE UP

Senate Will Decide about Impeachment of Commerce Court Judge (By Associated Press to the Coos Bay Times)

WASHINGTON, Aug. 1.—The final answer to the House prosecutors in the Archbold impeachment trial was made today to the Senate sitting as a court of impeachment. The prosecutor's answer was that their charges do constitute an impeachment offense. Archbold's counsel in their answer contended that they did not. All the papers in the case must be completed August third.

After today's session here the Senate will adjourn until two p. m. Saturday without deciding whether the trial shall go on at once or wait until fall.
