

It will cross only three large tracts of property, practically the entire route being over the Reynolds Development company's tract, the Southern Oregon company's holdings and the Simpson Lumber company's holdings.

The plan is to have the property owners dedicate a strip 200 feet wide the entire distance. The Reynolds Development company has already agreed to do this and the Southern Oregon company has verbally approved the plan through some of its officers. It is believed that 'he Simpson company will also agree to the project.

Senate Will Decide about Impeachment of Commerce Court Judge
